

# Islanders Take Over 2nd Place From Saints

## Large Crowd Thrilled By Brilliant Display As Locals Win 5-4

The Charlottetown Islanders regained possession of second place in the Maritime Major Hockey League here last night by shading Halifax Saint Mary's 5-4 in the hardest fought game on Charlottetown ice this season.

Don Bellringer's backhand shot from 20 feet out with slightly over three minutes left proved to be the winning counter in the wide open game that was action packed from the opening whistle until the final bell.

Bellringer's winning goal, his second of the night, came like a shot out of the blue. He took the puck of a Halifax defender's stick and let go his shot in one motion. The puck caught the inside of the goalpost on the right hand side.

**Close to the Wire**

But until the final whistle it was anybody's game. The lead sawed back and forth all night with never more than one goal separating the two teams. The Saints led 2-1 at the end of the first period, the Islanders knotted the count in the middle session and then outscored the visitors 3-2 in the last chapter.

Shortly after the third period opened Danny Nixon drove a 20 footer that seeped through Ray Frederick's pads. "Buck" Whitlock evened matters by drawing Jimmy Strachan after breaking into the clear at the blueline.

For the first time in the game the Islanders went ahead when Bellringer finished off a Smith-Marshall-Travis play and the score stood 4-3. The lead lasted almost four minutes until Watson flipped a rebound off Frederick's pads into the top corner. Bellringer's drive ended the scoring.

**Change Positions**

As a result of their win the Islanders move one point ahead of the Saints who slipped back to third position. Less than a week ago the Islanders were five points back of the Saints but their five game unbeaten streak has pulled them up to runner-up position.

Don Bellringer led the Islanders' attack with two goals. Willie Marshall, back in his early season form, scored one as did "Buck" Whitlock and Bullet Bob Gray.

Centreman Billy Watson, a powerhouse for the Saints all night scored one and set up another for Halifax. Other Saints scorers were Danny Nixon, Bob Bonness and speed merchant Bill Ford.

And despite the tough going, with rival defenses handing out shattering body checks, play was clean all the way. Referees Jerry Mathieu and Pete Mill handed out only eight penalties, all of them minors.

Forty-five seconds before the game ended defenseman Phil Vitale drew a penalty for handling the puck and the Saints drew goalie Jimmy Strachan. But the Islanders threw up a stout defensive barrier in front of Ray Frederick with the result that the Islanders forced five face-offs in their own zone but the Saints, with two extra forwards were unable to capitalize. The puck rolled crazily around the edges of scrambles on several occasions but always the Islanders recovered to the relief of the pent-up crowd.

Play opened fast from the first whistle. Bob Drainville fired the first shot at Ray Frederick while the Islanders were a man short at the former's blueline. He blocked nicely. With George McLagan sitting out a tripping penalty "Hub" Beaudry starred in a defensive role.

**Halifax Scores**

Bob Bonness fired the first Halifax goal. Deputy Thompson fed him a pass at the side of the net, and Bob slipped one past the extended feet of Ray Frederick. Danny Nixon drew an assist on the play, a nice three-way affair inside the Islanders line.

Less than a minute later Bob Gray got it back. He picked up a Phil Vitale face-off centre ice and fed the puck to Whitlock. "Buck" relayed the disc to Gray at the blueline and the big right winger carried it within 20 feet before driving it low into the rigging.

Billy Ford put the Saints ahead 2-1 with one of the prettiest goals of the game. The Saints broke out

with only one defenseman back. Watson deked the defender and slid a pass to the speeding Ford who converted from about a foot out.

Play was even during the period with the Islanders having the better scoring opportunities. Once Jim MacKenzie hit the goal post and seconds later he missed the open net. Willie Marshall, on the fly, had an opening but could not count.

Marshall put the Islanders back on even footing in the middle period. He took a goal mouth pass from Johnny Dutchak and flipped the puck into the corner in one motion. The goal followed a sustained Islanders attack with both teams at full strength.

**Goals Brilliant**

An outstanding feature of the period was the work of the rival goalkeepers. Strachan made a sensational stop off Trainor from close in after the latter, on a smart play with Favero, had worked through the Halifax defense.

Frederick was equally brilliant by blocking Bill Ford. The Halifax winger broke away from centre ice and Ray beat him. Freddy Weaver picked up the rebound and aimed for an open corner but Frederick made a diving save.

Billy Warwick and Joe MacArthur drew assists on Danny Nixon's early third period goal, a counter which put the Saints ahead 3-2. Four minutes later the Islanders got back on even terms with Whitlock scoring.

McLagan blocked a play at the Halifax line to start the ball rolling. MacKenzie picked up the puck and forwarded it about two corners to Whitlock who broke into the clear. Strachan made the first move and "Buck" shoved the puck through his legs.

A little over a minute later Bellringer put the Islanders out front. Smith centred the puck off the back-boards and Don flipped it into the corner in one motion.

But Halifax came roaring back with Bill Watson scoring. The goal proved to be only a temporary stay of execution but it was a cleverly executed play. Watson too a rebound off Frederick's pads and while the puck was still in the air he batted it into the top corner.

Bellringer's sudden goal ended the scoring. In the final period the Saints outshot the Islanders 11 to nine.

The game was one of the best witnessed here this season. The teams gave everything they had and the score pretty well indicated the closeness of the play. Only in the second period did one team appear to overshadow the other. The Islanders outplayed the Saints in this session and about the midway mark of the stanza had things pretty well their own way. The visitors came back in the last session however to give the Islanders a tough time of it.

Two Charlottetown juniors, now playing with Saint Mary's, Orin Carver and Lorne Hennessy planned to play with the senior Saints but were stopped yesterday evening. Hennessy, it will be remembered played two games for the Islanders at the opening of the season. The boys claim they have a good winter at Halifax. Last week they won the Maritime Junior A championship and are now preparing to meet Trenton juniors for the Maritime title. Trenton is the holder of the Maritime Junior B crown.

In the Islanders dressing room after the game matters were in a happy state. Don Bellringer, who scored the last two goals for the Islanders, remarked that he should have every other week off as he always had a good night after being out with an injury or sickness. He was referring to the game in which he and Willie Marshall starred after the two had been in hospital for a week. "Buck" Trainor was devising a method to beat Jimmy Strachan from in close and Phil Vitale was stating that he did not deserve the last penalty in the final minute of play. "I pulled the puck to my body while the stick before I touched it," he claimed.

Referees Gerry Mathieu did a pretty decent job out there last night. Mathieu was very good on the offside and also on the icing rule. Billy Ford may possibly have been off-side when he took a pass at the red line and broke into the clear on Frederick but it was very close and the officials let it go. If the officials keep coming up with performances as good as they gave last night there should not be too much complaining about their work.

"Hub" Beaudry is to the Islanders what Johnny MacCormack is to the Canadiens. "Hub" was outstanding in a penalty killing role last night. Several times when the Islanders were short handed the Saints presented little in the way of a threat and much credit for this could go to Beaudry. MacCormack, with the long poke-check is rated the best defensive forward in the N. H. L. When it comes to selecting a forward for killing off penalties in the M. H. L. there are none better than the Islanders utility man.

The Islanders executive last night decided against the proposal of paying to the two teams that finish outside the play-offs ten cents a head on each fan who attends the play-off games. There was no explanation for the decision but one of the factors that may possibly have entered into the consideration was the fact that the remaining teams refused to consider the Islanders request at the Halifax meeting having the payment of fines rescinded either wholly or in part.

## Sydney Shows Power Crushing Glace Bay 6-0 In Do-Or-Die Bid

SYDNEY, N.S., March 10 — (CP) Sydney Millionaires opened a do-or-die bid to shed their cellar position tonight by crushing Glace Bay Miners 6-0 before 1,944 spectators, the largest attendance here in a month, in a Maritime Major League game.

The shutout opened a gruelling schedule that sends the Millionaires into action on six consecutive nights.

Defenceman Joe Levandoski blazed the trail by firing three goals past Miner goalkeeper Bob Arnell. Fred Hildebrand counted twice, once on a breakaway and once on a blazing wing shot, while Cliff Roach tipped a single on a crease pass from Don McRae.

Nelmer Cliff Hicks, obtained midway through the season from Miners, racked up his second shutout against his former mates. He made 16 stops all told, one less than the shots blocked by Arnell in the second period alone.

Referees Larry Heffering and Marty MacIntyre ruled with an iron hand and a sharp eye. Heffering particularly was responsible in cracking what had the earmarks of a real old fashioned Miner-Millionaire skirmish.

He tabbed misconduct penalties on Sydney's Frank Bathgate and Arnell in the first period, which went scoreless, for unnecessary comment.

Miner defenceman Sheldon Bloomer and Sydney Coach Roach drew majors for a fast swinging exchange in the first. Bloomer got an extra deuce for breaking his stick over Roach's shoulder.
