Australian Regains World's Rowing Ch'ship

HENLEY-ON-THAMES, England, July 6 (CP) — The Diamond Sculls, emblematic of world rowing supremacy, Saturday was won for the second time by Mervyn Wood, 36-year-old Australian policeman.

Wood, current Olympic sculling champion, defeated Britain's Tony Fox, last year's winner, by 2 1/2 lengths in eight minutes, 12 seconds.

Fox last year defeated Erik Larsen of Denmark in the one-mile, 350-yard race, after a top contender, Jack Guest, Jr., of Toronto, had been eliminated in the preliminaries.

Canada had no contender in the race this year. Young Guest is being treated for a spinal malformation.

Wood won the Diamond Sculls first in the 1948 Royal Regatta, just before his Olympic triumph.

PHILADELPHIA, July 6 (AP) — Cuban Kid Gavilan, iron-jawed veteran of 98 pro fights, risks his world welterweight title Monday night against unbeaten Gil Turner, 21-year-old Philadelphia sensation, in a 15-round bout at Municipal Stadium.

With no radio, television or theatre TV to sap the gate, fans are expected to turn out 40,000 strong.

Turner, the home-town boy who made good by compiling an amazing 820 knockout average in stopping 25 of 31 opponents, has captured the imagination of Philadelphia fans.

"Wrecker" Billy Rix, the boy who won a name for himself by giving Steve MacDonald a tough battle in Souris last week, will meet Young Tiger Steele in a four round preliminary.

Steele, the son of a famous fighter, Stanley Steele and a brother of Tiger Steele has the background to make him a good scrapper.

Another fast four round curtain raiser will round out the attractive card.
