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NEW INCIDENT ADDS TENSION IN FAR EAST

Serious Study Of All Problems Is Urged Upon W.I.

Dr. Carleton Stanley Is Guest Speaker At Institute Convention — Delegates Hear Reports.

It was the duty of women, as of all citizens of Canada, to ask your- selves, "What is the real position of our own economic position in the quagmire of tariffs imposed at Ottawa and not suitable to you?" Dr. Carleton W. Stanley, President of Dalhousie University, Halifax, told delegates to the 26th annual convention of the Women's Institutes of Prince Edward Island. He was speaking at the night and third session of the two-day convention and was dealing with "Canada as a democratic nation and her place in world affairs." Women should ask and try to answer the questions he outlined, not leave them to the other sex, the speaker declared. If they did they would have a "real democracy" but if not "we shall be dominated by selfish and soulless interests."

CHEERS ECHO ACROSS SEA AS LINERS PASS

Passengers Shout Greetings As "Australia" Overtakes "Britain."

—ABOARD R.M.S. EMPRESS OF BRITAIN, June 21—(CP)—Two ocean liners passing at sea on the rolling Atlantic today provided a forerunner for the King and Queen of the mighty Maritime province they will receive early tomorrow as they cruise down the English Channel towards the tumult of a Southampton landing.

The Empress was overtaken as she neared the southern coast of England on the last stretch of her royal voyage home with the British Sovereigns. Practically all members of the Royal Party stood at the rail and watched the Australia slip by.
