

Pioneer Days In P. E. I.

When Angus Bernard MacEachern was fourteen years old his parents came to America and settled at Savage Harbor, in the Island of St. John (P.E.I.) His father, Hugh (Ban) MacEachern, was a farmer in easy circumstances, and desired that Angus be educated for the priesthood. So in the autumn of 1772 the youth entered the Roman Catholic college at Sarnia, where he remained for five years, studying the ordinary branches of commercial education. In August of 1777, Angus went to Spain and took up his classical studies at the Royal Scot college at Valladolid.

The following year he was ordained priest and returned to the Land of the Heather, where he engaged in missionary work for a time in the Western Highlands. In August of 1790, he arrived in St. John's Island, ready to carry forward the work that earned him the distinction of one of the greatest missionary priests of his time. His first chapel, which he helped to build with his own hands, was erected on his father's farm.

The work that fell upon the shoulders of this young priest was almost beyond the powers of one man to perform, for his field of labor covered the whole Island, part of Cape Breton, and the mainland. His flock included French, Irish, Scotch and English settlers. In these days roads were few and little better than cow paths, and for twenty years, with none to assist him, he traveled over his huge territory, preaching, marrying and burying the dead with unwearied energy.

On a beautiful April morning in 1835, the spirit of Right Rev. Angus Bernard MacEachern, first Bishop of Charlottetown, passed to the great beyond.
