EXPANDATE CANNOT ADOPT LAURIER'S PLATFORM.

A Liberal, Honest Announcement—The Side Begins—Thousands Will Follow—Why a Prominent Ottawa Lawyer Cannot Support Mr. Laurier.

Mr. A. F. McIntyre, the eminent lawyer and Q. C., who was only a few hours ago the Grit candidate in Ottawa, being asked in Montreal the other day if he was, as reported, not in accord with Mr. Laurier's policy, replied to the Press correspondent as follows: The article appears in The Daily Free Press, of March 15th:

"Well, yes; it is the fact. I am not in accord with the Federal party on the issues on which the coming election will be fought. It would be nothing short of a calamity if the people should endorse Mr. Laurier's trade policy—free trade as it is in England—and the destruction of every vestige of protection in the tariff. Nothing but the roughest sort of consideration on the part of the people can induce them to endorse this view.

"I do not see that Mr. Laurier and his friends could make any sensible reduction in expenditure. The fixed charges must remain, and public works in course of construction must be carried out, and my opinion is that, as money is cheap, the Government should, if necessary, go into the market and borrow what it requires, and as times are dull push the work upon their hands with vigor, giving employment to our people, and enabling them to tide over the hard times."

A Broad View. "Well, Mr. McIntyre," said the Press representative, "you don't seem to be in accord with Mr. Laurier's policy on the crucial questions of the campaign."

"I am sorry to say that that is the fact. It is a wrench for any man to divide from his old friends; but believing they are in error, I am compelled to differ with them on this occasion. I may say, as is known to Mr. Laurier and some of the other of the leaders, for whose ability I have very great respect, I have been differing with them on important questions for some years. Every party loses friends and obtains recruits. I must follow my convictions—whether they be right or wrong. I am in favor of a policy that will give work to our people and development to the country, of a policy of expansion rather than contraction, of expenditure at the present time, and under the present circumstances, I have faith in Canada, and believe it will come out of the existing world's trouble increased in strength, relatively to the strength of other countries. Mr. Laurier and his friends would appear to be in favor of 'Little Canada' and independence. I am a believer in Greater Canada and Greater Britain. The Little England party, go at as were its leaders, is a thing of the past, and the party of Little Canada cannot hope to have a large success. The times and that party are out of joint. This is conspicuously the case of union and progress. In the language of Lord Rosebery, 'The British Empire is the greatest instrumentality for good the world has ever seen.' Let us maintain it. In my opinion Mr. Laurier and his friends must have a larger faith in Canada, a larger desire for its rapid development, a larger appreciation of the glory and inestimable advantages of a continued and closer connection with the Empire, before the Canadian people are likely to entrust them with the administration of affairs."

A DEAL DECLARED.

How the Patrons are Working Their Cunning Schemes in Western Ontario. A gentleman named Percy A. Galan writes from Wheatley to The Mail and Empire as follows: "Patronism is just now being worked by the Patron leaders for all that it contains to secure a Grit majority in Ottawa and the leaders of the organization are winking at the game, by stipulating to escape detection until too late to save the country. Some Instances. A few instances are quite sufficient to expose this contemptible dodge and put every Conservative Patron upon his guard. Here in West Kent, previous to the last local election, Mr. James Clancy, a farmer, a Patron, and one of the cleverest members of the Legislature, held the riding; but he was a Conservative, and so not eligible for Patron support. An uncompromising Grit, and a man who was not even a member of the association at the time, was nominated by the Patrons. The Grit convention, a day or two later, ratified the Patron nomination, and made the Patron candidate its own. The result was the Liberal-Conservative Patrons, failing to see the trick, conscientiously supported the Grit candidate, believing him to be what he professed he was, and Mr. Clancy was defeated by some six hundred. But the Liberal-Conservative Patrons of West Kent must have had the scales removed from their eyes the other day, when, with bare-faced shamelessness, the professed Patron member for West Kent appeared on the platform of the Grit convention that nominated 'Dusty Dan,' the miller of the Don, to contest the agricultural riding of West Kent at the next Dominion election. But

what is Patronism doing in West Kent now?

Another Instance. The riding is held by a Toronto miller, an ultra Radical in everything but a pronounced pro-rittoist in the extent of one dollar a barrel duty on his flour. And so he is not to be opposed by a Patron because, for soot, as a prominent member of the organization said to me the other day, "Patronism and Liberalism are identical in Dominion politics." Here, in a county where a Patron would be certain of election, no Patron is to be brought out because the riding is held by a Grit. Let us look for a moment at how matters stand in South Essex.

Another Instance. Here the ultra Grit candidate has not the ghost of a chance as against the popular Dr. King, and what are the actions of the Patrons in this case? At the last local election a Patron candidate was put in the field, and I don't believe he polled enough votes to red his old post, were it a Dominion contest. In one of the polling subdivisions, where the organization numbered some hundreds, the Patron candidate got only fourteen votes, and a lack of seven of these were Conservative votes. But still, in the face of the overwhelming defeat, only a few months since, the Patrons have put a candidate in the field for the Dominion election, a Liberal-Conservative. I am told, brought out by Grit wirepullers to split the Conservative vote and defeat Dr. King. Surely such shallow trickery will no longer deceive the Liberal-Conservative voters. Surely in a contest like the coming one, in which our very national existence will be at stake, Conservatives are not now going to assist in furthering the deep-foundation schemes of our young nationality that noble old hero, whose sacred dust now reposes in Caterque, spent his life in laying and died in defending. With his holy turn to protect from desecration, with the memory of that noble soul who, through forty dark and stormy years, led his people through a desert to the land of promise, and who sank himself into his country's arms just as the vista of a gloomy and ungodly broke upon his vision, the great and good principles of Conservatism cannot fail."
