SUMMERSIDE PRICES.—In Summerside on Saturday, according to the Pioneer, potatoes were changing hands at 23 cents per bushel. Oats were still at 42; pork from 5 to 5 1/2 cents—another drop of a quarter cent—and beef was selling at from 3 1/2 to 4 cents.

HORSE KILLED.—We learn from the Agriculturalist that on Wednesday last Mr. Robert Douglas, of Northport, went to do some threshing for Mr. Peter Harrington, of the same place, each putting a horse on the mill. While they were at work the belt came off, and Mr. Douglas' horse stumbled, got caught in the machinery and was killed. Mr. Harrington's horse was injured, but escaped being killed.

CHANGED HANDS.—The Agriculturist reports that the Island bred horse Comet, formerly owned in Summerside, has been sold by Messrs. Delahunt & Savage, of Amherst, to a party in Moncton, and his late owners have purchased another Island bred horse, Bradburne Bay, 2 1/2. This horse, which is now five years old, was bred by Mr. Joseph Biggar, of Bradburne. He is by French Lion, and is an excellent roadster.

MORE SHIPMENTS.—On Thursday morning, says the Summerside Pioneer, Messrs. Aard and Drummond shipped 190 lambs for the United States market and on the following morning they sent off 430 more. On Friday Mr. J. H. Henry also sent away 210 for the same destination, while Mr. Bliss Fawcett took away 60 for Sackville. On Saturday again 20 were shipped by Mr. McGrath for St. John. Only a few horses were sent away during the last three days.

There are still sixteen schooners, nearly all of a large size in port, with a carrying capacity of about 55,000 bushels. Of these four are about loaded, and two or three others have taken in part of their cargo. Potatoes moved freely during the week without any change in price. The supply is equal to the demand. The decline in the Boston market and the unsatisfactory returns received from cargoes shipped to Nova Scotia ports will have a weakening tendency in price.

Oats have taken an upward tendency, and are now selling at 44 cents a bushel. A considerable quantity changed hands yesterday. Mr. P. Kelley alone, without any special effort, received at his warehouse 800 bushels, and he expects to get 1,000 bushels to-day. Pork is moving briskly, with a downward tendency, at from 5 to 5 1/2 cents. During the last fortnight, McDonald Bros. purchased over 100 carcasses, and P. Kelley 19,226 lbs. of pork for shipment, while other merchants did an equally good business in the pork line. Beef brings from 3 1/2 to 4 1/2 cents; sheep pelts from 45 to 55 cents; butter by tub from 18 to 20 cents; eggs 14 cents.

Last year the number of vessels that entered at the Custom House up to Nov. 30 was 149. This year the number entered up to date is 146. Judging by the entries, the quantity of produce shipped this year would be about the same as last year, up to date.

Considerable indignation is manifested at the action of the Harbor Master in allowing vessels to dump their ballast into the river, at a short distance from the bridge. Where it is now being deposited, it will be a great obstruction to navigation, and must sooner or later be removed. Why not have it deposited inside the wharves, where it would be a great benefit instead of an injury? The attention of the Marine Department is respectfully called this very important matter.
