

Islanders Score 6-2 Win Over Miners In Penalty-Studded Game

The Charlottetown Islanders slipped into sole possession of second place of the M.M.H.L. last night amid scenes of fighting that would make Robert Service's versions of northland barroom brawls seem pale in comparison, as they defeated the Glace Bay Miners 6-2 at the Forum.

From about two rows back of the seething penalty box to four feet out on the ice the fans, players and cops tangled in one of the most heated fist throwing, stick swinging, apple tossing, enmeshments that has been staged in the Forum for a good many years.

The first outbreak came in the closing seconds of the opening period with Coach "Bud" Poile of Glace Bay and Johnny Dutchak being the players involved. The second battle commenced midway in the third but this was only a preliminary to the grand finale when Johnny Morrow, Johnny Myketyk and Sheldon Bloomer drew misconducts in a brawl between the players that ended with "the King" being played.

And to cap off the evening the players staged a brief battle of their own at the final whistle. "Hub" Beaudry and Len Haley started things rolling with a fist fight into which Ron Bohmer, Phil Vitale, Windley and a host of others soon joined. Again the strains of the King calmed matters.

A total of 25 penalties were handed out in the bruising contest with 12 of them going to the Islanders and 13 to the Miners. Six players drew misconducts and two men got majors.

But between the periods of fighting the players found time to score eight goals. Big Walter Pawlyshyn, playing his best game this season was the leading goal getter with two. Conny Bonhomme, Willie Marshall, Don Felhinger and Jim MacKenzie were the other Island marksmen.

Len Haley scored both of the Baymen's goals. His first came shortly after the half way mark of the opening period and his second about the middle of the third. "Kid Line" was the Islanders' best attacking unit. Willie Marshall and "The Dinger" each got a goal and two assists while Conny Bonhomme picked up a point on his goal.

Back in the middle of things was Jack "Spy" Ready. "Spy" assumed the role of a peacemaker in the fighting but he also played some hockey and played well.

Take Early Lead
The Islanders jumped into a 1-0 lead before the eight minute mark of the period as Conny Bonhomme rifled home Willie Marshall's pass from the side of the net. Goalie Cliff Hicks never had a chance on the shot. Six minutes later Haley tied matters up.

Before the period ended Marshall and Pawlyshyn put the Islanders into a 3-0 lead. "Hat Trick" Willie scored on a play with Bellringer while Pawlyshyn's goal came from a Phil Vitale pass.

Both goals were scored while the teams were each a man short. Poile and Johnny Dutchak were sitting out penalties for fighting in a battle that saw the Glace Bay coach take a severe belting from the fists of the Islanders' defense men.

35 seconds before the period ended Poile received a misconduct for disputing a holding penalty to "Hub" Macey. Before he was seated in the box he tangled with fans behind the penalty box and the police were called in to quiet matters.

Walter Pawlyshyn shot the only goal in the second period. He took a pass from "Buck" Trainor at his own blunder and broke out with two men to beat. He beat both of them and whistled a shot into the top right hand corner of the cage.

Earlier in the period Pawlyshyn drew one of the misconducts handed out. Cooper of Glace Bay got another one about six minutes later.

Bellringer, Haley and MacKenzie were the marksmen and in that order in the third session. Haley's goal was scored after Hal Gordon had stopped a blistering shot by John Bailey. Haley scooped the rebound from out under Gordon's pad and slipped the puck into an open net.

Willie Marshall sent Bellringer into the clear on "The Dinger's" goal. MacKenzie's counter came on a ganging attack with Whitlock and Morrow.

That ended the action as far as the scoring was concerned, but there was plenty more in the penalty box. Early in the period Bailey drew a two minute sentence and was no sooner in the box than he was hit by an apple. He gestured at the fans, struck an innocent spectator over the top of the head with the flat of his stick before being calmed down.

Johnny Myketyk was the principal in the last outbreak. Len Haley drew a minor for charging Don Bellringer into the boards and Myketyk went wild. He shoved the referee, banged his stick on the ice and argued bitterly before entering the sin bin to serve a misconduct.

No sooner was he in the cooler than the outbreak started. Myketyk and the police tangled as Myketyk advanced towards the spectators. The players of both teams crowded onto the ice and headed for the scene of action.

In the midst of the battle a spectator reached over and drove a right into Myketyk's face while the Glace Bay players' arms were being held by two men. Morrow and Bloomer drew misconducts for their part in the battle. After matters started to quiet down Forum manager Bill Brown made a personal request to the fans to take it easy.

Danlovitch, Glace Bay defenseman was injured in the first period. He suffered torn leg ligament, while attempting to stop the Islanders' first goal.

Larry Travis, Phil Vitale and Johnny Dutchak were again outstanding on the Islanders' defense and they were ably supported by the stellar goal tending of Hal Gordon.

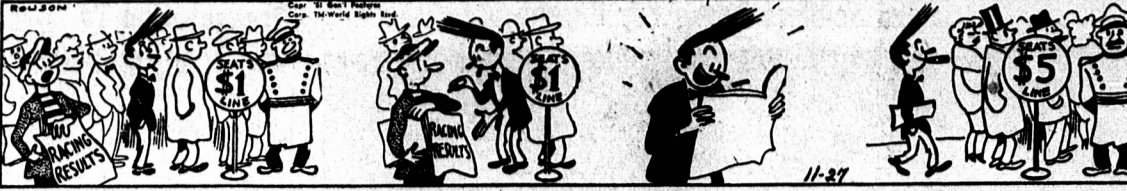
Miners' Appeal Turned Down

SYDNEY, N.S., Nov. 26—(CP)—The Canadian Amateur Hockey Association has turned down an appeal by Glace Bay Miners against a decision that awarded players Jerry McCabe and Kenny Biggs to Sherbrooke St. Francis, it was learned here today.

McCabe and Biggs played for Miners last season. Glace Bay demanded that the players be returned to the grounds that they had not been released by the old Miners organization or the new community-sponsored club which took over this year.

The C.A.H.A. voted 11-10 in favor of the Sherbrooke claim, and the appeal followed.

The saddest display that could be witnessed at an athletic contest, that of fans and players fighting, was only too evident last night in the game which produced as much action behind the penalty box as there was on the ice. The prime object of sport, that of physical and spiritual betterment, was badly forgotten about and in its place was substituted some of the savagery that surely would have been the envy of the crowds in the Roman colosseums back in the days when men and lions tangled.

To lay the blame for all the unbecavil and behind the penalty box, on all the fans in that section or on all the players in the penalty box would be grossly unfair.

The causes for the unruliness between the Miners and the fans could probably be equally attributed to both. As in most cases of his kind, mob action took over where reason left off. Unfortunately, perhaps, the saying "there is safety in numbers" is true. In any event it is probably one of the reasons why persons in the back row find courage enough to hurl objects at players or why some one else will strike a man in the face while his hands are held. It might also be one of the reasons why a hockey player will hit an innocent spectator over the head with his hockey stick.

From accounts of those who were sitting behind the penalty box, profane language and gestures were used by the players. If this was the case there are league officials and the Forum management to whom the matter could be taken. According to "Bud" Poile, Glace Bay Miners coach, there were objects thrown at the players and Poile himself stated that he suffered a cut which required two stitches to close.

Poile claimed that a warrant would be issued for the arrest of a man who allegedly struck one of his players while the player was being held by the police. An assault charge will be laid against the party involved. The Glace Bay coach stated that the display was the worst he had ever seen by fans and that the police "behaved in a disgraceful manner." He also said he was taking the matter to the League executive. Poile added that the players were not safe in the penalty box and that he asked the Forum to provide protection in future.

A netting or some method of separating the players in the penalty box from the fans is definitely needed and would probably have been instrumental in preventing the brawl which occurred last night.

An organization whose name has almost become synonymous with amateur sport in the Province, the Charlottetown Abegweits, will hold its annual meeting tomorrow night in a Marshall's restaurant. 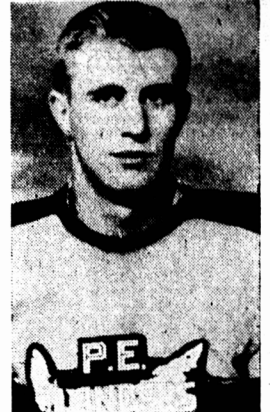

Ottawa Team Gets Warm Welcome Home

OTTAWA, Nov. 26—(CP)—Jubilant Ottawa fans today greeted their victorious Rough Riders with an ovation as the Grey Cup winners rode through town in triumph.

A six-inch snowfall lent color to the scene as the motorcade bearing the Riders moved through the main streets and Ottawa fans lined the sidewalks four or five deep. Thousands of schoolchildren were given time off to witness the celebration.

At Confederation Square, where a stand had been set up for presentation of the cup, the crowd almost got out of hand until Mayor Charlotte Whitton made a personal appeal to Ottawans to behave themselves.

The Governor-General, Viscount Alexander, who was delayed by the bad driving weather, made a stalwart plunge behind the interference of four policemen to get to the stand at all.

He presented the Grey Cup to Bill Stanton and Don Loney, co-captains of the Ottawa team, saying: "I was there, and it certainly was a wonderful game."

"This," he added, passing the huge mug to the captains, "was a terrific thing to win."

The mile-long parade had included trucks carrying effigies of the hapless Regina players, and one carried a coffin to denote the downfall of the western champs.

After the presentation, the crowd screamed for Pete Karpuk, a hero of the game, and the little backfielder was raised shoulder high by his teammates. The other members of the team in turn got the same treatment.

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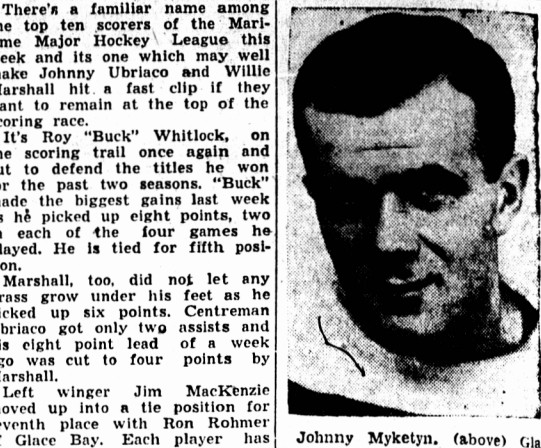
