No Trouble Spending Mr. Abbott's Surplus

OTTAWA.—When Parliament meets this fall, with finance Minister Abbott blushing to report a surplus already nearly 14 times greater than the \$30 million forecast for the entire fiscal year, he will suffer no lack of people telling him how to spend it.

Some members of Parliament, those of the CCF party, are expected to plump for using the money to finance Old Age Pensions. They may argue that from the size of the surplus left even after making allowances for greater defence spending later in the year, it is feasible to pay the pensions out of current revenue, without imposing a special social security tax to finance them.

And some members of all parties believe Parliament should do something to relieve the hardship of pensioners caught in the squeeze between static incomes and rising prices.

These MPs want to increase pensions so they'll be worth, in real purchasing power, what they were worth before prices started to soar. They would boost payments to war disability pensioners, civil service pensioners, armed services pensioners, blind pensioners and old age pensioners.

If this were done, they probably wouldn't suggest disturbing the plan under which the government intends to finance the new universal old age pension of \$40 a month at 70 by contributions from employers, employees and the federal treasury.

Such action would not, of course, help many more pensioners of business and industry. However its argued that the Government could set an example which private industry might follow.

But all these suggestions entail pumping more purchasing power into the hands of the people with no corresponding increase in productivity—something which Abbott's economic advisers surely would oppose as being a spur to inflation. The growing surplus reported each month by B. G. McIntyre, the comptroller of the treasury, has now reached such proportions—\$409 millions as of July 31—that a few MPs are even saying "Let's use it to start the St. Lawrence Seaway."

Government experts estimate that construction of the Seaway on the Canadian side of the river would cost nearly a billion dollars, with the U.S. participation, since that doesn't appear likely to be forthcoming anyway—argue that on the basis of the Government's financial record and present economic prospects, the government would be justified in taking the gamble.

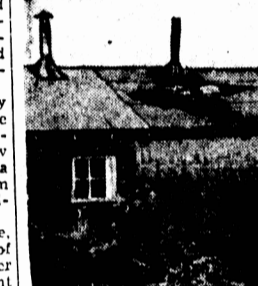
In the last five years, for example, Government surpluses have totalled \$1869 millions, or twice as much as the St. Lawrence seaway would cost.

However, these \$1869 millions ended up in the hands of the Nation's creditors, being used to reduce the National Debt, and if Abbott has his way, the year's surplus is very likely to be put to the same use despite the arguments of those who can think of a "better" way to spend it.

Elderly Gardener Faces Murder Charge

Seventy-one year old Harry Shymick, a retired gardener living in a remote section of Port William, Ont., is faced with a murder charge involving Arnold Crocker, 55-year-old hermit, who lived in the other end of accused's shack. Shymick is said to have walked six miles with the aid of his cane to report he had shot Crocker for chopping a hole in his room. He said he warned the trapper to stop and when he didn't he fired through the hole with his .22 rifle, wounding the latter in the back of the head.

Blame Compass For Loss Of Ship

HALIFAX, Aug. 28.—(CP)—Two ship officers testified today the freighter Dufferin Bell's magnetic compass indicated she was off course before she went aground near Louisburg, N. S., May 13.

First Officer George C. Rose and Second Officer Warren Pope said the magnetic readings indicated the ship was off course about eight degrees but they depended on the ship's gyro as was usual in heavy seas. They said they felt some concern earlier when the gyro compass developed an error in southern roses.

Mr. Rose said the magnetic compass was last adjusted in 1947 as far as he was aware. He was on watch when the ship was lost, but had no warning of the impending accident until 20 seconds before she hit the rocks. The hearing in Admiralty Court here is continuing.

Triplets Born At New Waterford, N. S.

NEW WATERFORD, N. S., Aug. 28.—(CP)—A girl, the third of a set of triplets, was born here today more than two days after the birth of the first child.

The three—two girls and a boy—are the children of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Roach. The boy, weighing six pounds, seven ounces, arrived at 8:10 A.M. Sunday. The second child was born at 10:45 A.M. today and the third 25 minutes later.

The Roaches have four other children, the eldest seven years of age. The triplets, delivered by Dr. C. P. Miller, are doing well.
