MILITARY.

On Wednesday the 4th Regiment of Canadian Artillery, consisting of the three rural companies in camp and the two city companies which had drilled at local headquarters, was inspected at Victoria Park by Major Rivers, R. C. A., of Quebec. The day was fine and the forenoon was devoted to the Georgetown, Souris and Montague companies. Their marching, wheeling, manual and firing exercises were excellent, showing great care and aptitude on the part of the men as well as careful training on the part of their officers. These companies, on their arrival in camp, had many recruits who in the twelve days' drill were now looking quite soldierly.

In the afternoon as the clock was striking three, punctual to the minute, Captain H. M. Davison marched upon the field at the head of his veterans, No. 1 company—and they are number one in every particular,—and no doubt about it. As they marched upon the field in perfect alignment and regular step, this magnificent company received many compliments. So also did No. 2, who, a few minutes later, with Captain F. W. L. Moore in command, marched with military precision upon the field to quietly measure swords with their popular rivals; for it must be understood that the contest for supremacy is between these two fine companies. They were at once taken in charge by Major Rivers, the inspecting officer, and put through a series of evolutions in company drill, manual and firing exercises, etc., etc., all of which, to an onlooker, were performed with the utmost precision. The companies were then marched to the drill shed where each company furnished two detachments for drill upon the 40-pounder B. L. guns and two for the 64-pounder M. L. guns. Here the men acquitted themselves in their usual efficient manner. The Artillery Band, under the leadership of Bandmaster Worth, was on the field and enlivened the proceedings. They were also inspected and pronounced O. K. Yesterday the glorious first—the two 40-pounder B. L. guns were taken over to the Kinlock range. Here, under command of Lt.-Colonel Montzambert, R. C. A., who acted as umpire, the five companies had the usual target practice.

The weather was unfavorable, but we understand the boys sent the heavy missiles to the mark with wonderful precision, and reported "range found" in a truly military manner. Lieut. E. McDougall R. L. acted as range officer. The infantry were also inspected by Lieut.-Col. Moore, D. O. C., Wednesday and Thursday, who we understand, was very much pleased with the efficiency of the grand old 82nd and its band.
