NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

THE LONDONDERRY STEEL WORKS. MONTREAL, June 9.

The Gazette, in an editorial says: "The announcement of the intended suspension of work by the Londonderry Steel Co. will, we are glad to believe, prove premature, if the causes of that decision are not other than those publicly attributed. It will be remembered that the Company stated their disability to continue operations to be due not to the National Policy, not to any increase in the cost of coal or cost of production, but to high rates of freight from the place of manufacture to the Quebec and Ontario markets. There had, however, been no increase of rates on the Intercolonial Railway, and if such had occurred, it must have been on the Grand Trunk section, although we are inclined to think it was rather a reduction in through rates from Liverpool to Montreal and Toronto, than an increase in the rates from Londonderry to these points, which placed the Steel Company in a less favorable position as regards freight rates than they occupied a year ago. However, we are glad to be able to announce that the Government has determined, in view of the importance of this industry, to apply coal rates to the transport of pig and bar iron from Londonderry to Riviere du Loup, and have also made very favorable coal rates. Of the importance of the Steel Company's Works there is no manner of doubt. Not only are several hundred men employed in connection with them, but in the conduct of the industry very many thousand tons of coal are annually consumed, and more than one hundred thousand dollars is annually paid to the Intercolonial Railway for transportation charges. The desirability of continuing this enterprise the Government have fully appreciated in the action taken by them. They have granted a protective duty of two dollars a ton on imported iron and have now removed all complaints as to freight rates. Everything that a Government can do to foster an industry has been done, and if in the face of the advantages afforded the Company they are obliged to suspend operations, the reason will have to be sought in some other cause than that of insufficient encouragement on the part of the Government. We trust, however, that such will not be the case, but that on the contrary we will be able to announce in a day or two the decision of the Company to continue their important industry."

HALIFAX.

HALIFAX, June 9.

About 100 invalids and soldiers whose time have expired on this and the Bermuda garrison will return to England by the mail steamer to-morrow.

Jerry Holland, the well-known and experienced trainer of the Centennial Crew, has taken charge of Warren Smith for the coming race, and will supervise his practice on Long Lake during the next few weeks.

Hon. Sampel Creelman, Commissioner of Works and Mines, and Principal McKnight, D. D., left on the Intercolonial train to-day to attend the Presbyterian Assembly at Ottawa.

MONTREAL MATTERS.

MONTREAL, June 9.

His Grace the Duke of Argyll attended St. Andrew's Church yesterday, p. m., Rev. Gavin Lang officiating. His attendant in full Highland costume, attracted considerable attention on the street.

Mr. J. G. Ascher is the winner of the first prize in the tourney of the Canadian Chess Association, which has just concluded; Dr. H. Howe, second; Prof. W. H. Hicks, third; E. C. Holt, fourth, and W. J. W. Shawe, fifth. The next tourney of the Association will be held in Ottawa. The Queenville inquest was resumed this a. m. No clue yet to the murderer, although \$1,500 reward is offered.

QUEBEC, June 9.

OTTAWA, June 9.

Full returns from the County of Russell give Baker (Conservative) a majority of 25. Mr. Compton, of Halifax, one of the Dominion arbitrators, is here on official business.

On Saturday about 75 laboring men waited upon his Worship the Mayor at the City Hall in relation to employment or getting assistance so as they could go where work is to be had. The issuing of Corporation passes was recently abolished and it has now been resolved to send some fifty men up to work on the Canada Pacific, arrangements having been made by his Worship with the contractor whereby the ten dollars a head for transport will be refunded at an early day. So soon as the \$500 refund is made, another gang of 50 men will be assisted to these public works.

MONTREAL, June 9

A despatch from New York to the Witness says: "It is not likely that the 69th Regiment will go to Montreal. Many members decline. Capt. Matthew P. Breen, an influential officer, writes this a. m. to the Sun denouncing the proposed trip. After touching on the loyalty of Irish Canadians, he asks, 'What will the boys of the 69th do on the occasion of the Dominion Day Banquet? Should they refuse to drink the

Queen's health, they would be offering a gratuitous insult to the hospitable hosts. Should they rise and to a man swallow the dose, the Irish people will stand aghast at so marked a recantation of principles—the main spring and life of their organization. He refers to Ireland's troubles in terms bitter with hate to England, and concludes thus:—

"Whenever Irish military organization shall step with the confines of England's Dominion let it be not in an attitude of deferential loyalty, but with the high and holy purpose of raising the standard of freedom and tearing down the emblem of tyranny, so that the colors of our regimental plume may not be reversed, and that still the green may wave above the red."

"Breen's sentiments are endorsed by many Irish Americans that I have seen."

There is a feeling here, even among Irish Catholics, that J. B. McNamee, President of St. Patrick's Society, has done an imprudent thing in inviting the 69th. He sent the invitation entirely on his own responsibility.

His Grace the Duke of Argyll, with Lady Mary and Lady Elizabeth Campbell, visited the Geological Survey and McGill University this forenoon, and this afternoon took a drive around the mountain. They will proceed to Quebec to-night.

GALVESTON, June 9.

The News Eagle Pass special says early yesterday morning a company of Mexican infantry at Piedras Negras mutinied and fought their way through the guard at the gate. About 15 crossed to this side under a heavy fire from the loyal troops, who continued firing after the deserters landed, many balls striking the houses of this place. The fugitives surrendered their arms to the citizens to be returned to Mexico. A number of the mutineers were killed on the Mexican side. The cause of the desertion is that the troops were six months without pay and had nothing to eat. Yesterday evening the Mexican troops marched outside the city with two captured mutineers whom they were going to shoot, but a strong protest from citizens caused the execution to be abandoned.

CHICAGO, June 9.

The robbers who seized from an Illinois Central Railroad messenger \$10,000 on Saturday afternoon were captured yesterday and a portion of the money recovered.

VERMONT, June 9.

The Deputies this afternoon authorized the prosecution by the Government of Paul De Cassagnac, after a scene of great excitement, during which Gambetta moved the expulsion of Cassagnac from the House, but afterward withdrew the motion, Cassagnac having withdrawn the word 'cowardice' which he had applied to the conduct of the Government.

HAVANA, June 9.

The Spanish bank yesterday publicly burned \$1,053,363 paper currency of its own emission.

ROME, June 9.

The Pope has appointed Cardinal Hergenrother Keeper of the Archives of the Holy See.

BERLIN, June 9.

The North German Gazette publishes the text of Germany's protest against the decree of the Khedive of April 22nd. The protest says the decree is a direct violation of international obligations, and Germany must decline to consider it binding and will hold the Khedive responsible for all consequences of his illegal proceedings.

CONSTANTINOPLE, June 9.

The inhabitants of Djuma district are preparing to resist the return of the Turks when the Russians evacuate. They have sent away the woman and distributed arms to the men.

ROME, June 9.

The eruption of Etna has ceased, but the volcano is still smoking. A riot against the collecting of taxes occurred in the district of Catania, in which several soldiers and peasants were killed.

BERLIN, June 9.

The Emperor, Empress and Bismarck have returned.

Marriage of Prince Leopold.

An official announcement, writes a London correspondent, will probably soon be made of an intention of marriage on the part of Prince Leopold and the Princess Marie of Hanover, daughter of the late ex-King of Hanover, and sister of the Duke of Cumberland. The report has just become known in the inner Court circle, and is accepted as correct. This alliance is understood to have an important bearing on the relations of the deposed Royal family of Hanover with the German Court, and to have engaged the friendly attention of the Empress of Germany during her late visit to the Queen. Prince Leopold, who is now 26 years of age; is three years younger than his destined bride. The Princess Marie—should the Duke of Cumberland arrange the existing dispute with the Prussian Government—will bring a fair dowry with her. She brings at least a wealth of names, having been baptized Marie Ernestine Josephine Adolphe Henrietta Therese Elizabeth Alexandra. The Princess Marie adheres of course to the religious profession of the house of Hanover, the Protestant Lutheran.
