Island Odds and Ends

There is a shortage of farm help in many parts of the Province. It has been felt more keenly ever since the haymaking season started. This summer for the first time in several years, the National Employment Office in Summerside and Charlottetown did not arrange to bring workers from Nova Scotia to the Island.

The arrival of Dutch, German and other European farm laborers in the province has also been much curtailed. Only Europeans whose services have been specially sought by individual farmers will come to the Island this year. Their number will be very small. Many farmers feel they cannot afford too much extra help this year, but welcome having a man around for the haying.

Dingwells Pond on the Charlottetown-Souris road seems to have attracted quite a run of sea-trout from the very beautiful but frequently disappointing Fortune River. After the last big moon (and tides) the sea-run definitely had found its way into Dingwells, probably the first of the so-called by-pass ponds in the province.

Among Charlottetown fishermen who took a nice assortment of fish from the fresh run, were Dr. "Gus" MacKenzie and "Chick" Williams. These men took home what can only be described as an old-time catch, a number of trout, well over the pound mark, and all as clean as a silver dollar.

Strawberries are still being picked and hulled hereabouts. Since the harvesting of the berry crop started, the National Employment Office in Charlottetown has supplied more than four hundred workers to growers and cooperative associations. All but seventy of the total were females. The seventy were teen-age boys, who worked as pickers.

All the top-notch racing talent in the Maritimes and some from beyond seems to be gathering for Charlottetown's Old Home Week. The Sweeney stable from Nova Scotia South Shore is one of the latest arrivals. Mr. Sweeney will be remembered as the owner of the renowned Toll Gate, one of the great campaigners on the Grand Circuit a few years ago. Mr. Sweeney brought Toll Gate to the Maritimes after the great performer had reached and passed his peak in big time racing. But he was still a fine piece of horse flesh, and "need some great miles" on Maritime tracks. He was a big favorite with Island race followers.

Colonel D. A. MacKinnon's horses have not been landing in the win brackets very often this summer. Says the Colonel—my horses are being fine but they have one big fault—they are not fast enough. It
