MONSTER MEETING IN THE RINK

Messrs. Stewart and Martin Speak

LIBERAL DECEPTION AND MISCONDUCT EXPOSED.

Government's Treatment of Our Soldier Boys Denounced.

The big meeting in the rink on Tuesday night was brought to a close with rousing speeches by Mr. W. S. Stewart G. C., and Mr. Alex. Martin, M. P., the Liberal-Conservative standard-bearers in West and East Queen's. Both gentlemen came forward in response to repeated calls, and each was given a great ovation. Mr. Stewart said:—

Ladies and gentlemen,—I cannot expect that anything I may say at this late hour of the night, after the speeches you have heard from the distinguished Canadian statesmen, will be acceptable to you. But I think I may say that every patriotic citizen and every elector of Prince Edward Island who has the interests of good government at heart must feel a great indebtedness to these gentlemen for the sacrifices they have made in coming to address the electors of this province on the eve of the election which is to be held. We are particularly indebted to the chief-tain of the Liberal-Conservative party who in the month of July entered upon his eightieth year, but who, impelled by his duty as a public man still has the courage, patriotism and spirit to cross the Straits of Northumberland and come among the people of Prince Edward Island to place before them intelligently and clearly as he has done tonight the great issues for their consideration and for their decision. Although he has contributed to the great deeds of Canadian statesmanship and possesses a record perhaps already greater and more illustrious than any other Canadian statesman living or dead, yet the people of Canada do not seem disposed even at his very advanced age to let him go; and they appear to have made up their minds that he shall at least for a term of five years more be Premier of this Dominion of Canada. (Applause) They want him to carry out and perform some of the things that were knocked on the head by the bungling and incapable government which has ruled at Ottawa during the past four years. Take for instance the East Atlantic Service, the contracts for the performance of which were entered into under the Liberal-Conservative government and which would have been the means of carrying not only the people between the two continents but of transporting swiftly to the European markets the cheese, butter and other products which the people of Canada manufacture and raise. This contract was made by Sir Charles Tupper on the eve of the dissolution of his government, but when Sir Wilfrid Laurier came into power he tore it into shreds; and from that day to this no similar contract has been entered into although they have had Mr. Doherty, a member of the Government, making an exhibition of himself every few months running back and forth between Canada and the United Kingdom endeavoring to secure a contract which they had taken up from the hands of Sir Charles Tupper ready-made would have carried out all the conditions that Canada required. In addition to that the Pacific cable—a contract which the late Government had ready to carry out and accomplish—has been bungled and set aside, and has not been carried out and fulfilled until the present time. We therefore need the great services of Sir Charles Tupper and his colleagues to right these things, and not only these but to rectify other matters in which you are deeply interested. Select, for instance, binder twine, which interests every farmer in Prince Edward Island. Owing to their incapacity and inaptness for government the binder twine of this country costs the farmers today over twice as much as it did during the years the Liberal-Conservative party held power in Canada. It is too late for me tonight to tell you how this has been done, but on some future occasion I will have an opportunity not only in Charlottetown but throughout the riding of West Queen's to lay before the people more at length why these things are so. I may also mention another article that is of universal use in this province—the article of coal oil. It has gone up here 3 cents a gallon more than previous to 1896, and I am told that in other provinces of Canada it has increased to the tune of 5 cents a gallon more. Why, gentlemen, the Liberals when in Opposition when going about the country—the Liberal leaders hungry
