Employment Officials Open Conference Here



The opening meeting of the conference of Maritime Employment Office officials, which took the form of a banquet, was held at the Charlottetown last evening and was presided over by the Atlantic Region Supervisor, Mr. R. P. Hartley of Moncton. Premier J. Walter Jones addressed the meeting briefly, stressing the place that the products of the farm and the sea have had on human life and progress. His talk was most interesting and instructive. Mayor J. D. Stewart, in extending a welcome to the delegates, expressed the hope that their deliberations would be profitable and that their stay in the city would be an enjoyable one. Dr. R. B. Bryce, Assistant Deputy Minister of Finance, who arrived from Ottawa to address a meeting at St. Dunstan's University this afternoon was among the guests. Other notable guests were Dr. Frank MacKinnon of Prince of Wales College, Mr. Clarence Murphy of St. Dunstan's University, and Mr. Leo Currie, Assistant Executive Director U.I.C. in Canada, from Ottawa. Members of the conference concluded the evening's enjoyment with a dance in the R.C.A.F. quarters, Bank of Commerce building.

Each of the exhibits had one cockerel and three pullets. They were judged by Mr. F. A. Driscoll who placed those of Morell first, followed by Red Point, Vernon River and Kingsboro.

W. I. Display In the Fox Pavillion used by the Women's Institute there was an excellent display of work of the various clubs of the Province. The needlework section alone was one of the best displays seen in a long time. It was not judged, being there for display only. Included were items in a wide range from complete dresses and aprons to fine needlepoint, embroidery to skirts, mitts to towels. All showed an admirable attention to detail and a skill far beyond that expected of youngsters.

The Garden Club displays attracted a great deal of attention with the award for First Year Club going to Mt. Mellick and that for the second year to Alexandra. Both team winners were treated to a special prize award by Mr. Arthur Vessey, York, who arranged for the winners to have a plane ride over the city.

Drawing a great deal of commendation from those attending the fair was the Garden Club exhibit of the young club members of Fairview. Not so large as the displays of other clubs it was still shown excellently with all the vegetables properly sized and placed in an attractive background.

During the afternoon there were a large number of sporting events staged on the grounds. The Department of Agriculture had prepared a beautiful banner to be awarded the winning team to hold for one year. Points in the events were given on a three, two, one, basis for first, second and third.

Tied for first place were the Gowan Brae Calf Club and the Malpeque Calf Club. It was decided to give the banner to the Gowan Brae team for six months and they will then present it to the Malpeque Club for the balance of the year. In third place in the competition was the Miscouche Clothing Club.

The senior tractor competition was won by Ralph Smallwood, Southport Garden Club, while the junior event was taken by 12-year-old Beryl Robins, Morell Poultry Club. The contestants were scored on a three-point basis: observance of common safety

precautions, skill in driving and time required to complete the course. Judge for the events was Mr. W. S. (Bud) McMurtry of the Provincial Farm Improvement Service.

In the Women's Institute building just at the rear of the show ring were displays shown by groups and organizations from various sections of the province. Among those participating were: The Vocational School, the P.E.I. Dairymen's Association, the Department of Industry and Natural Resources, the National Film Board, P.E.I. Libraries, Southport Garden Club, Junior Club Work, Mt. Hope and Farmington Grain Club, New Haven Food Club, Department of Health and Welfare (Nutrition Division), St. George's Grain Club, Fairview Garden Club, Alexander Garden Club, Mayfield Gardeners Club, Mt. Mellick Clothing Club, Miscouche Garden Club and the Tracadie Garden Club.
