It was too decomposed, however, for cause of death to be determined, but evidences of several witnesses caused the jury to return a verdict of willful murder against persons unknown.

MORE LIGHT.—A German inventor has devised a means of producing a light superior in strength to either oil or electricity. It is by means of air driven through pumice stones, the latter having been impregnated with benzine. The benzine gas thus obtained is then carried through a fine magnesium powder, and proceeds upward through a pipe to be consumed in a small flame of a claimed 400,000 candle power. The apparatus consists of a blast-engine for driving the air through the pumice, and a number of other accessories, all of which take up but a small space.

Attempted Homicide

Mad Attempt of a New York Composer.

PITTSBURG, Pa., July 25. About 2 p. m. on Saturday H. C. Frick, manager of the Carnegie Steel Company, was shot by Alexander Berkman, a New York composer. Frick was in his private office. Berkman came in and fired four shots at Frick, two taking effect. Frick will probably recover. Berkman was arrested. In his mouth were found two cartridges. It is thought that he attempted to commit suicide, but that the cartridges were defective and would not explode. When asked why he shot Frick the prisoner said "You know why."

The steamer Tide took a lot of non-union men to Homestead on Saturday. About 500 men are said to be working there now.

A MONCTON SENSATION.

Mysterious Disappearance of an Insurance Man.

MONCTON, July 25. A sensation has been caused by the mysterious disappearance of Mr. Snow, of this town. He left Moncton on Thursday afternoon to visit the scene of a fire twenty miles back of Hampton in King's County, upon which destroyed property he held a risk. It was his intention to have returned Friday at noon and to deliver an address at the decoration services in the cemetery. Early on Friday morning he was seen at Hampton, but from that hour to this all traces of him have been lost. It is feared that he is either lost in the woods or that some accident has occurred to him in the poorly settled part of the country.

General Telegraphic News.

PITTSBURG, Pa., July 22.—A high official of the Carnegie Steel Co., when asked this afternoon by an associated press reporter as to the condition of affairs at Homestead, replied it was very encouraging for the firm. A number of new men have gone to work and some strikers went back to-day. The company has more workmen than it can easily handle. Only good men are engaged. According to this official the 11.9-inch plate mill and the 32 inch slab department are running in full this afternoon. All the other branches of the large steel works are being gotten in readiness for resumption at once. The steamer Tide arrived at Homestead about noon with 52 men, carpenters and mill workers on board. They made their landing without incident. At Carnegie's upper and lower union mills there is no change in the situation. At Beaver Falls the shut down is complete.

St. John's, July 20.—Forest fires are still raging and twenty-one houses were burned at Whitbourne to-day, making thirty-five in all. The inhabitants saved nothing. Father Brown, the Catholic priest, had to remove his furniture. A large lumber mill and the summer residence of Colonial Secretary Bond are in great danger. The fire near Topsil is still advancing and the town is covered with smoke. Within the city building operations are progressing on the upper streets, but on Water Street, where absentee landlords own the property, nothing is done, as they want exorbitant rents. A public meeting will be held to-morrow night to petition the legislature to take action in the matter, as financial ruin will result if large mercantile premises cannot be rebuilt. The steamer Havana arrived from Halifax to-day with \$10,000 worth of relief goods.

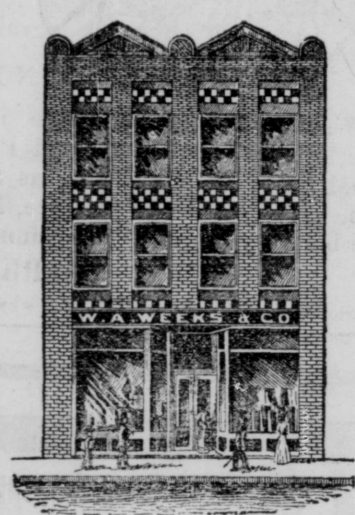
