## Carnival Returns Small Net Profit

A big success despite a small net profit was the view of the 1959 Summerside Lobster Carnival expressed by the central committee at their final meeting last night which concluded with an enthusiastic determination to continue the carnival again next year, and make it bigger and better than ever.

Reviewing the events and financial experiences learned of the 1959 carnival, the committee heard a number of recommendations for next year from carnival treasurer Dick Henthorn, who reported, from a revenue of about \$19,000, a net surplus of approximately \$1,900 of which \$1,500 will be divided among the six participating service clubs.

In commending carnival director Charles Hogan for his untiring efforts for the promotion and success of the lobster carnival, Mr. Henthorn recommended that the carnival director be given more direct assistance from the service clubs through the appointment of a second representative from each club.

Mr. Henthorn said he was preparing a complete brief on accounting for the incoming carnival committee, which could be standard procedure for all future carnivals. He recommended that serious consideration be given to abolishing some large lobster carnival expenditures, which would include such things as hosting organizations, the number of carnival bands, discontinuing the track and field meet, and the Sea Queen contest in their present forms, and placing the float parade expenditure on a rigid budget.

A.H. Hubley, president of the Summerside Board of Trade, suggested that a committee be appointed from the next central committee, to study the cost-cutting possibilities for the 1960 carnival.

Carnival chairman Roy Johnston suggested that the new lobster carnival committee would meet with him early in the new year to review the recommendations.

Treasurer Henthorn stated that if any one expected the 1959 carnival to be a money-making affair they were going to be disappointed, but he personally felt that the Lobster Carnival was good for Summerside.

Mr. Jenkins, who was in charge of the lobster supply, said it had been planned to operate the lobster supper part of the carnival at near cost, and this had been done despite a high price for lobsters at that time of the year.

He said the profit from the dinners had been only about ten cents a plate, and if more revenue was considered necessary from the dinners it would mean an increase in the price of meals.

Carnival Director Hogan suggested that service clubs make early appointments of their representatives to the central committee.

Mr. Hogan expressed a wish to resign as director of the carnival, a position he has filled since the organization began four years ago, however, a motion was made by Roy Boates requesting him to

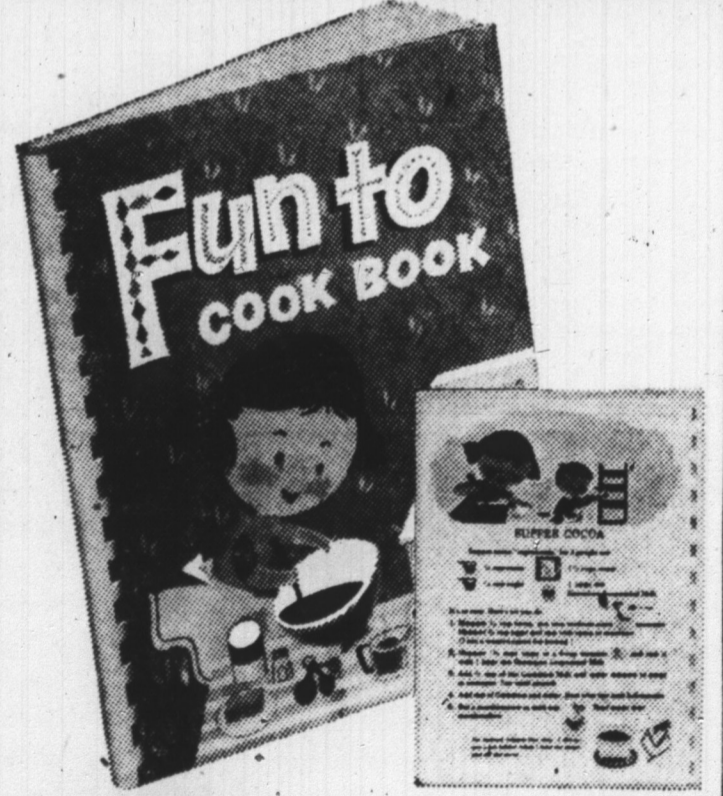
