LATEST WAR NEWS.

France Wishes to Join the Fray—Turkish Intervention and the Conditions.

John Bright's Resignation Accepted.

A Royal Appointment.

LONDON, July 16.

France is showing an increasing disposition to take part in the intervention in Egypt.

The conditions asked by the Powers in the event of Turkish intervention are that the occupation shall last three months, at the expiration of which time the Khedive can demand that it be prolonged if he deems it to be necessary, and that the cost of the war shall be defrayed by Egypt. No Egyptian Commissioners are to accompany the Turkish troops.

It is believed that the Porte will not accept those conditions, and will refuse to dispatch the expenditure.

John Bright's resignation has been accepted.

His Royal Highness, the Duke of Connaught has been appointed to the command of the Brigade Guards in Egypt.

STRAWBERRY BLANC MANGE.—Stew nice ripe strawberries, strain off the juice, and sweeten to taste; place over the fire, and when it boils stir in corn starch wet in cold water, allowing two table-spoonfuls of corn starch for each pint of juice; continue stirring until sufficiently cooked, pour into moulds wet in cold water, and set away to cool; serve with cream and sugar, and fresh strawberries if desired. This makes a pretty and delicious dessert. Raspberry blanc mange prepared in the same way is equally good.
