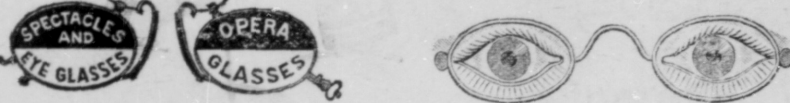

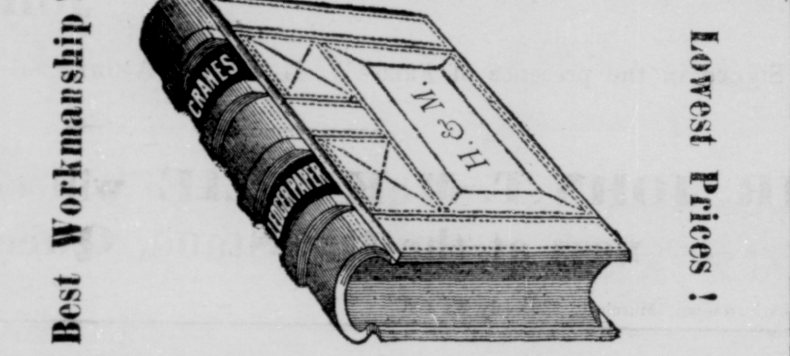

## LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

### Irreligious Thought in Summer-side

SIR,—I was taken by surprise when I read the epistle of "Zeno" to the citizens of the world. This Stoic philosopher called our attention to the fact that we are in the midst of a mighty religious revolution, and that it was begun about fifteen years ago. I had read of the twelve apostles whom Christ had chosen to confound the wise, and I asked myself the question, "Has the band of deep thinkers in this town undertaken to remodel the religious condition of the world?" They have to a very contract on hand. The best way is to supply the citizens with the works of Tyndall, Huxley and Darwin. Get them to believe that the soul was formed from protoplasm, that it is purely material and not at all spiritual, and you will soon revolutionize religious thought. Teach them that they are descended from the monkey, that they are only a higher development, by natural selection, of the ape, and their religious notion will be quickly modified.

It is a grand thing to see the spirit of tolerance which exists in our town. This can hardly be due to the school system as the same system prevails all over the Province. Still even the Catholics are growing tolerant; for when we got our great public library, out of several hundred volumes, we only purchased two volumes written by Catholics, and they made no fuss about it. See how tolerant we have made them. Of course if any one asks if there ever was a Catholic who wrote anything fit for a library we will call him a bigot, and that will silence him.

It is with feelings of pride that I heard our town proclaimed as the intellectual hub of Canada, second to none in literature and literary taste. It is a great thing to live in a cultured town, chiefly if tolerance is the result of culture, as it is here and in Boston.

When I realized that I was in a cultured town, I looked around for the source whence this culture emanated. I found that it was not from the university men; for they were so orthodox and sectarian that they opposed this revolution. Universities, you know, are such a narrow environment. I had to look elsewhere. In a handful of tradesmen I found the source of this great intellectual activity. Strange to say, one would never conclude from their physiognomies that they had any extraordinary philosophic acumen. Still, nothing is unknown to them. The English Materialists are known to them. They are familiar with Kant and Hegel, with Schelling and Fichte, with Plato and Aristotle, with Emerson and Tom Paine. They may not have acquired marked distinction in their respective trades; they may not always be able to pay one hundred cents on the dollar; but they know all things knowable.

Is not it a great boast to be living in a cultured and tolerant city where, whether you can get a good photograph or not, whether you can get a good pair of breeches or not, whether you can get a good bride for your horse or not, you can always meet with intellectual men who will discuss on synthetic philosophy, on the critic of pure reason, and discuss with the Concord philosophers "the thinness of the shell and the hardness of the nut." Of course these literati are themselves tolerant and cultured. Else how would they reflect such bright coruscations on the town? They would never breathe an unbecoming word of a member—much less a clergyman—of any Christian sect. They would disdain to meet at anybody's conscientious convictions. They are only calm, cool reason, for "they are all—ill honorable men."

So the revolution goes on. I thank my stars that I live in this period of transition. When over the Presbyterians and Methodists remodel their creeds to suit the new apostles, I will inform you. We expect the Baptists to cave in shortly. Won't it be funny too when we hear the religion of Humanity preached from the pulpits of St. Mary's and St. Paul's? We will have to get Macaulay's New Zealand or Sumner's to sketch the ruins not only of St. Paul's but also of St. Mary's.

## An Editor's Experience.

SEVERE TREATMENT OF POLITICAL PRISONERS—AN AGITATION FOR REFORM.

According to a recent despatch from Berlin, Herr Boshard, editor of the Gotha Gazette, a radical daily, has just been liberated from Lichterhausen prison, to which he was sentenced for several years because of the ultra-democratic articles in his journal. He is now publishing a series of relations concerning the abuse practiced in the prison, especially towards the political prisoners. The "cost," he says, is used daily, despite the fact that flogging has been forbidden in all German prisons. He saw two men whipped stripped to the waist until blood ran from their backs. The political prisoners received no better treatment than the lowest convicts. They got only enough water for drinking. His repeated appeals for a bath eventually provoked the keeper to such a rage that he threatened Herr Boshard with a flogging in case the latter again mentioned the subject. Herr Boshard went unshowered until the ninth month of his sentence expired. He was not permitted to shave himself, and when his wife sent him his razor and brush they were seized by the prison officials. Herr Boshard's object now is to bring up the subject of prison reform in the Reichstag, and several Radical and Social Democratic Deputies have already promised to interpellate the government on the subject during the discussion of the budget of the Imperial Department of Justice.

## News Notes.

Word comes from Jamaica that war is imminent between Hayti and San Domingo.

The revolutionists of Rio Grande de Sul, Brazil, 4,500 strong, are marching on Porto Allegre.

One thousand depositors in Rockefeller's broken bank at Wilkes-Barre, Pa., will only get five cents on the dollar.

Barbadoes advises that H. M. ships Blake, Magicienne, Cleopatra, Tartar, Pelican, Partridge and Bozzard left there for Grenada.

The chartered banks of Vancouver, B. C., will accept American silver only at 20 per cent. discount after March 1, in order to get rid of the overflow.

American exports in 1892 decreased \$32,000,000, Canadian exports increased \$15,000,000. This fact is dedicated to the Opposition leaders with due sympathy.

A Government bill taking steps toward the ultimate disestablishment of the Welsh Church was adopted in the British Commons a few days ago by a vote of 301 to 245.

The commander of the British fleet on the North American station with several vessels, if war will attend the naval review at New York in honor of the Columbian anniversary.

There is a row in St. Paul, Minn., between the Western Union Telegraph Company and their operators, ten of whom have been discharged suddenly and without explanation.

The national banks of Denver are hoarding gold. Over two million dollars in gold is held in the vaults in reserve. The bankers admit that they have larger gold reserves than they usually keep.

The new treaty which has been made between Venezuela and Colombia is the first step towards a triple alliance, which is to include Ecuador. The alliance is to be formed for offensive and defensive purposes, but will not have any direct connection with the Panama canal question.

British exports to Canada, according to the Old Country returns, have been going steadily up these last three years as follows: 1890, £7,226,000; 1891, £7,243,000; 1892, £7,427,000. That is an answer to critics who say that our present fiscal system is responsible for a share in the decline in English trade.

An English justice has decided that a missing word competition is illegal, and the organizer, who has funds amounting to £23,000, is liable to over 460,000 claims from the people who put their shillings into the contest. Such a career as petty defendant is of course regarded as a punishment that fits the crime.
