

Rowers Disappointed At AAU Track Meet

 NEW YORK (CP) — Jim Beatty of the United States ran the mile in three minutes, 39 seconds. Russian Valery Brumel cleared seven feet, 3/4 inches in the high jump. Russian Igor Ter-Ovanesyan went 36 feet, 6 1/2 inches in the broad jump. And Canadian Bill Crothers won again in the 1,000 yards.

But there wasn't a world record in the bunch—and nobody cleared 16 feet in the pole vault as 19,215 jammed Madison Square Garden Saturday night for the U.S. Amateur Athletic Union's National Indoor Championships, billed as the climax of the current indoor track season.

Biggest disappointment came in the pole vault where Finland's Pentti Nikula, who cleared a world-record 16 feet, 9 1/2 inches at home Feb. 1, failed miserably and placed fifth in his first U.S. start.

Dave York, West Virginian who won in Toronto a month ago with 16 feet, 2 1/4 inches, cleared 15 feet, 6 inches to win here.

The crowd was disappointed, too, that Toronto's sensational Bruce Kidd didn't appear for the third time in the 1,000-yard Marcel Bernard of France

on the boards. She had won the Toronto Olympic Club, won the half-mile in each of three indoor appearances this year. mark of 3:58.6 he set here last week. Beatty, 38-year-old runner who holds the world record for the two miles, clocked his first try at that distance in 12:38.4. Kidd withdrew because of a foot infection.

Crothers, 22-year-old University of Toronto student, disappointed the crowd as he gave Canada the first of two victories in the meet—the other was scored by 16-year-old Abby Hoffman of Toronto in the women's 440.

Crothers was well off his best time in 2:07.4, but he turned on his famous last lap speed—something New York crowds have come to expect from the East York Track Club runner who won the half-mile at the New York Athletic Club Games last week to win the 1,000 in 2:09.8.

The victory was the seventh in succession at that distance for Crothers, who runs in Chicago in two weeks and in London a week later.

It also marked his third straight triumph over Russian Valery Bulishev, who finished third Saturday night behind Ralph Lindle of the U.S. and ahead of Ergas Leps of Toronto, who finished fourth in 2:12.3 after leading until Crothers started his kick.

Crothers and Bulishev later displayed a personal friendship, stripping to the waist in the 1,000 in the floor to exchange track jerseys.

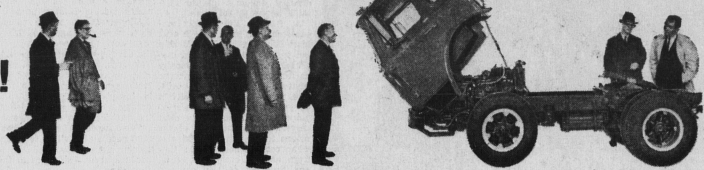
quarter in 38 seconds—slow by comparison with his 36.8 last week—and he beat Jim Grelle of Los Angeles by a full second.

Brumel, the soaring Russian who has an outdoor mark of 7 feet, 9 1/2 inches pending for the world record and who cleared 7 feet, four inches here in the NYAC games, went over 7 feet, 3/4 inches on his first try Saturday night after his chief rival, John Thomas of Boston, had failed at 7 feet, 2 inches.

But the Russian missed three times at 7 feet, 5 1/4 inches. He made his last appearance of his current U.S. visit.

Ter-Ovanesyan, the other member of the three-man Russian squad, was below his indoor record of 28 feet, 10 inches set Feb. 1 at the Millrose Games here, but he defeated Ralph Boston of the U.S. on the third time. Boston jumped 25 feet, 9 1/4 inches.

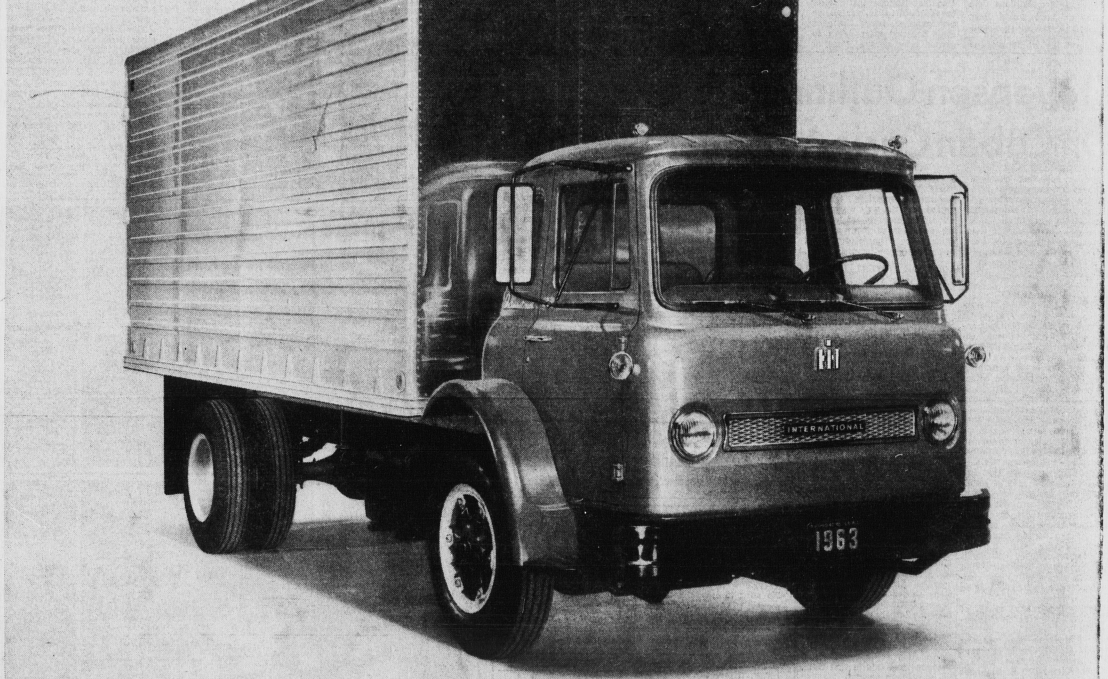
