

Lord Chelmsford And Cetewayo.

The London correspondent of the Manchester Guardian says:—

"Grave dissatisfaction, which, however, has not yet fully found expression, is felt concerning the treatment by Lord Chelmsford of Cetewayo's envoys conduct which Sir M. Hicks-Beach has apparently sanctioned on the part of the Government. Cetewayo's messengers were repulsed, yet Lord Chelmsford, in his telegram dated May 17th, says that John Dunn, the best authority believed they had with them the elephant's tusk, the sign of being in earnest; and again, 'Dunn thinks the King means business.' The attention of the Government will be called to another part of Lord Chelmsford's despatch, in which John Dunn, on his Lordship's behalf, threatened all the Zulu chiefs in these words:—'They must come in at once, trusting English clemency, and they would not be badly dealt with, but if they stay with the King when I advance all would be destroyed.' It is thought extraordinary that an English Commander-in-Chief could transmit a message so inconsistent with the usages of modern warfare, and so grossly injudicious, as tending to prolong the war to the last extremity by leaving the Zulu chiefs no alternative but unconditional surrender or destruction."

"Sir Roger's" Prison Life.

The Claimant is at present in her Majesty's convict prison at Portsmouth where he is employed in stacking timber, in which occupation he is said to be quite at home. He does as much work as any three men in his party, and this not—as he himself says—from any superior strength that he possesses, but from a "knack" of shifting logs, which he acquired in the backwoods of Australia. By his fellow-prisoners the Claimant is regarded as "a very good sort," always ready and willing to lend a hand to a fellow-prisoner. About three years ago he was transferred from Dartmoor to Portsmouth, when he was put in the tailors' shop to repair prison clothing, but having had a quarrel with one of the men in the shop, he applied to the governor to be put out of it, and was accordingly transferred to the stacking party, where he has remained ever since. At first the "Claimant's" appearance on public works created considerable excitement crowds flocking to the prisoner eager to catch a glimpse of him as he marched to and from labor, but the novelty soon wore away, and he now marches in and out of the prison scarcely noticed. Although his health is good, his prodigious bulk has considerably decreased. He does not weigh more than 15 stone. He is allowed extra food to the extent of about one-fourth more than the ordinary allowance. Some time ago he petitioned the Secretary of State for some reduction of sentence, when the governor was instructed to inform "Arthur Orton, alias Thomas Castro, alias Roger Tichborne, that there were no grounds, &c." This answer the Claimant felt very keenly.

While the drama of Shakespeare has almost ceased to meet with appreciation in the land of his birth, and among those who speak the language, its popularity has been steadily on the increase in Germany. During the theatrical season of 1877-8, no fewer than 428 representations of his plays were given throughout the States of the Empire, the large number of 27 plays being given. Winter's Tale leads the list, with 42 representations; Hamlet had 40; Midsummer Night's Dream 38, and Merchant of Venice 37. Some of the best critics of the great dramatist have also been Germans.
