

# Roberts Unworried Over Heavy Pitching Chores

BROOKLYN, (AP)—Just how long, baseball men are wondering, can Robin Roberts continue the murderous pitching pace cut out for him by manager Steve O'Neill?

A majority of Roberts' Philadelphia Phillies teammates think he can keep it up. This list, of course, includes O'Neill.

One, however, who asked not to be identified, commented:

"Robbie is helping nobody pitching every third day. He'll wind up with a sore arm, the club will be minus its start pitcher and we'll be all up to the creek. Sure Robbie is a great pitcher. But he's not an iron man. Why should he be able to do something that no pitcher has done for 30 or 40 years? He's not a machine."

The sensational right-hander smiled when the question was put to him as he was preparing to face the Dodgers in the first game of a day-night doubleheader Saturday.

## Can Continue All Season

"I believe I can go along this way for the remainder of the season," he said. "I feel I can do the club more good by pitching every third and fourth day than by working once every five days."

"Pitching every third day hasn't bothered me a bit. Maybe it's because I throw with such a loose, easy motion. Maybe it's because I don't use any truck stuff, like a

screwball, a knuckler, a fork ball. I'm just a fast ball, change-up, and curve man."

"For some strange reason, I pitch better when I don't get too much rest."

## Iron-Man Schedule

Roberts has been following an iron-man schedule this season, Saturday's was his fourth start in 10 days and his eighth in the first 24 days of the season.

At this rate, the 26-year-old Roberts should pitch better than 400 innings. No National Leaguer has been able to do that in 45 years. Robbie hit 230 innings last year, a figure topped only by Burleigh Grimes since the advent of the lively ball in 1921. Grimes who now manages in Toronto, hurled 331 innings for Pittsburgh in 1928.

Only three 20th century pitchers have been able to reach 400 innings in a season, iron man Joe McGinnity, big Ed Walsh and Happy Jack Chesbro. Walsh's 464 inning in 1908 stand as the all-time mark. He won 40 games that season.

How many years does Roberts think he can go along at this strength-capping pace?

"I'd rather have five real fine seasons on pennant-winning clubs than pitch 10 or even 20 years on also-rans," he said. "I don't like being with a fourth and fifth place club like the Phillies have been the past two years."

# Believe CAHA, QAHA May Settle Differences

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., (CP)—The Canadian Amateur Hockey Association and the Quebec Amateur Hockey Association came to this famous honeymoon spot Sunday with mutual intentions of ending their divorce.

The couple got together for polite gestures at reconciliation in Toronto during the week-end. The CAHA's annual meeting, opening Monday, will form something of a full bench court sitting on the estrangement case.

Three things are necessary to bring about reinstatement of the suspended Quebec branch: 1. Application for reinstatement; 2. consideration of this application and re-shaping it into a resolution by the CAHA's resolution committee; 3. approval by the general meeting.

The QAHA was suspended last February for "defying" the CAHA by issuing a playing certificate to a junior player. The CAHA maintained the player was not properly transferred from the Ontario to the Quebec branch. The QAHA maintained it acted within its jurisdiction and regulations of the CAHA itself by issuing the certificate.

The suspension of the QAHA followed. Two weeks later it was made general, covering all leagues, clubs and players within the Quebec branch.

The position now is that the QAHA, in applying for reinstatement, must in some way purge its contempt or leave the whole question still in the air and the breach further widened.

George Dudley, secretary-manager of the CAHA, said he feels sure the difficulties can be ironed out and everything settled. So does Martin Conway, president of the QAHA.

## Q.S.H.L. Question Mark

One matter that confronts both sides is the position of the Quebec Senior Hockey League. This powerful seven-team league, in order to avoid suspension in the CAHA's blanket disbarment last March, resigned from the QAHA. The resignation was made so the league could protect its player rights with professional bodies. If the QSHL had invoked terms of the CAHA-proposed agreement, by which the pro leagues would have had to recognize the suspension.

After the league's resignation, the pro bodies agreed to continue recognizing player lists.

The QSHL is meeting in Montreal Monday night to consider whether it will turn professional.

On this point, Dudley said: "We are not concerned about the QSHL."

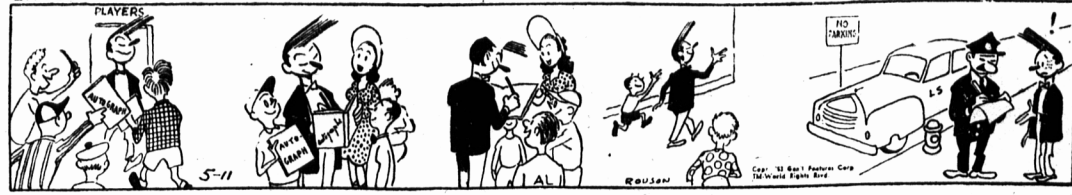

# Roy Campanella Has Outstanding Week-End, Getting Four Home Runs

Bulky Roy Campanella, who would rather play baseball than eat, had a week-end that was a batter's dream.

The solidly-built Brooklyn Catcher chalked up four home runs and drove in the winning run twice as the Dodgers took two games out of three from Philadelphia Phillies to unseat the Phils in first place in the National League.

Camp's two-run homer in the ninth gave the Dodgers a 7-6 victory over Robin Roberts, an old Brooklyn nemesis, in the opener of a day-night twin bill Saturday. The next two four-baggers came in a losing cause as Curt Simmons set the Bums down 8-4 in the afterpiece.

Sunday's encounter Roy produced a three-run homer in the fifth inning and drove in the other two tallies with a two-run double in the third as the Dodgers won 5-0. At the same time he was master-minding a six-hitter by Billy Loes.

The slugging outburst boosted Campanella's league-leading home-run total to 10 and his pace-making total of runs batted in to 38 in 21 games.

While the Dodgers gained their half-game edge on the Phils, Milwaukee Braves took two out of three from Chicago Cubs to grab third place by half a game over the Cincinnati Cardinals, who were slapped down twice by the last-place Cincinnati Reds Sunday after winning their Saturday engagement.

New York Giants took three out of four games from Pittsburgh Pirates in remaining National League activity.

The American League leaders stayed put as New York Yankees took two single games from Boston Red Sox while Cleveland Indians stayed two percentage points ahead of them taking two from St. Louis. The third-place Chicago White Sox claimed two out of three from Detroit Tigers and Washington Senators knocked off Philadelphia Athletics three times in a row.

The Senators got a two-hit job from Walt Masterson to win Saturday's game 6-0 and Bob Portier followed with a one-hitter as the Nats took Sunday's opener 8-0. Only a seventh-inning single by Eddie Joost robbed him of a hitless performance. Home runs by Jack Jensen and Jim Busby wrapped up a 6-2 victory in the second game.

Mickey Mantle's fifth homer of the season highlighted the Yankees' 4-1 victory over Boston Saturday. On Sunday the world champions came from behind a 3-2 deficit at the end of six innings to outslap the Sox 7-4.

The Indians needed 10 innings to shade the Browns 3-2 Saturday but pounded out 10 hits and

12 runs in the last two innings to take the Sunday tilt 12-3. Al Rosen paced the Tribe with two homers.

Lefty Bill Hoeltz gave the Tigers an 8-6 victory, his second of the season over the White Sox, in between two Chicago slugging bees in which they pounded the cellar club 12-3 and 10-5.

A two-hitter by Harvey Haddix gave St. Louis a 4-2 victory over Cincinnati Saturday while Bob Rush threw a three-hitter at Milwaukee as the Cubs blanked the Braves 2-0.

But Sunday the Reds made the most of two homers by Andy Seminick to take the first game 4-2 and got their first two runs without benefit of a hit as they took the afterpiece 5-2.

Rookie Don Liddle, a Brave southpaw, limited the Cubs to two hits as he beat the Cubs 4-1 in his major-league pitching debut after the Braves had won the opener 6-2.

Ralph Kiner's home run gave the Pirates a 2-0 edge over the Giants in Saturday's opener but good relief pitching by Hoyt Wilhelm salvaged the second game for the Giants 6-4. On Sunday Sal Maglie pitched a three-hitter to win 4-0 and a pinch homer by Bobby Hofman gave the Giants the nightcap 3-2.

# 18 Race Horses Lost In Fire

COLUMBUS, O., (AP)—Fire caused by an electrical short circuit raced through a newly-built stable at Beulah Park race track in suburban Grove City Sunday, suffocating or fatally burning 18 horses valued at \$52,000.

A stable boy, Jack Chapman, 26, of Luton, Ill., was overcome by smoke as he attempted to rescue some of the terrified horses. He was treated at a doctor's office.

Firemen from Grove City and neighboring Jackson fought the flames and smoke for two hours before bringing the fire under control.

# Billy Goodman Slightly Injured

BOSTON, (CP)—Second-baseman Billy Goodman of Boston Red Sox suffered a rib injury Sunday while teammate Jim Piersall was dragging him bodily to the dugout in an effort to keep him from arguing with the umpire.

The normally mild-mannered Goodman went after umpire Jim Duffy after complaining about the call on a close play in the fifth inning. Piersall restrained Goodman and his action in pulling Goodman to the dugout apparently caused a minor strain of a rib cartilage. The second-baseman is expected to be able to play again Tuesday.

# Local Athlete To Undergo Operation At Troy, N. Y.

A young City athlete, Lorne (Lal) Hennessey will leave today for Troy, New York where he will undergo an operation for the removal of an injured cartilage in his knee. Hennessey is expected to be out of the Province for about two weeks.

He suffered the injury three weeks ago but joined the Troy Trojans at the beginning of the last winter's hockey season. He played throughout the winter, although sometimes hampered by the injured knee.

A snappy infielder on either side of the key-stone sack, Hennessey's loss will be deeply felt by the Maritime Centre Airways baseball team. Last year Lal played short stop for M.G.A. and two years ago he was second baseman for the Junior Abbies when they advanced to the finals for the Maritime Junior Baseball title.

Although a good ball player Hennessey was more noted for his hockey playing ability. He played for two years with the Halifax Saint Mary's Juniors when the Saints won the Maritime Championship and last year he graduated to senior ranks with Troy in the Eastern Amateur League.
