Canada And U.S. Revise Tax Treaty

By HAROLD MORRISON Canadian Press Staff Writer OTTAWA (CP) - Canada and the United States have completed months of negotiations on tax treaty amendments which may open the way for greater Canadian participation in the operations of American-owned firms operating in this country. It was learned Wednesday that the new bilateral pact likely to be signed shortly at a ceremony here, it must be ratified by Parliament and the U.S. Senate before it becomes operative.

Dies Of Cancer Month After Murder Attempt

NEWCASTLE, Eng. (AP)—Mrs. Harold Mercer, 49, is dead of cancer, just over a month after her husband sought to end her suffering with an overdose of sleeping tablets.

Mrs. Mercer died Tuesday at her home. She was cared for by the last by her bricklayer husband, who attempted to end his own life with the same drug after over-dosing his wife June 17.

Mercer was charged with attempted murder. He pleaded guilty and was placed on three months' probation.

Mrs. Mercer died without ever learning that her husband had sought to hasten her release.

Milk Prices At Amherst Advance

HALIFAX (CP) - The Nova Scotia public utilities board has approved a one-cent-a-quart increase in the wholesale and retail price of milk in Amherst.

In a decision handed down Wednesday, the board approved a retail 19-cent-a-quart price for bottled milk and 10-cents-a-pint; 21-cents-a-quart for milk in paper containers and 20-cents-a-quart for homogenized milk.

The price increases are effective August 1.

Complaints have been voiced before the royal commission on Canada's economic prospects that Canadian laws act to restrict Canadian participation in U.S. firms.
