Conservatives Nominated In Fourth Prince

A Progressive Conservative nominating convention for the Fourth District of Prince was held last evening in the Central Bedeque hall, president John Green presiding, and Mr. R. R. Bell, provincial leader in attendance. After a brief discussion, it was unanimously approved to follow the usual procedure and nominate a councillor and an assemblyman, rather than nominate two candidates whose status would be decided later.

President Green then called for nominations for councillor and Mr. William Sherry of Fernwood was nominated by acclamation.

Mr. Keith Boswell of Victoria, Mr. Wallace Muttart, Carleton and Mr. D. H. Crossman, Albany were proposed for assemblyman and after an indecisive first vote, Mr. Boswell was elected by a majority vote on the second ballot. Mr. Sherry and Mr. Boswell thanked the delegates for their support and stated they would do all in their power for the fourth district and Prince Edward Island.

Mr. Bell congratulated the winning candidates and also the convention on what was accomplished at the meeting. He stated that the Conservative Party wishes to get all their members in the field as there is a possibility of an election this fall.

A resolution was passed expressing confidence in both the national and provincial leaders and in the nominated candidates.

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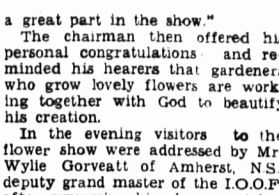
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Youngest Contender

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Find Death of Electric Co. Lineman At Kensington Aug. 18 Accidental



That "Gordon Freeman Rix came to his death by accidental electrocution at the town of Kensington on August 18th, 1954, and we attach no blame to anyone," was the verdict reached by a coroner's jury Tuesday night at an inquest presided over by Coroner Dr. W. E. Callaghan.

The deceased, an employee of Scales Hydro Electric Company of Pictou, was killed instantly on August 18th when he came in contact with a high voltage line while making an electrical connection.

Mr. Elmer MacEachern, Pictou, a foreman with the Scales Hydro Company, was the first witness and stated that he and Rix had been running secondary leads to the home of Miss Adelaide Campbell in Kensington at the time of the accident. After connecting a lead wire at the top of the pole, the witness said the deceased stooped to connect the bottom lead when one of his steel climbers struck a knot causing him to lose his balance and as he swung around the pole, his head hit a primary wire. At the same time his head and arms struck the high tension wire which threw him down across the transformer.

MacEachern said he called Dr. L. K. Zielinski, shut the power off the line and got the deceased down to the ground with the help of Major Inglis. The witness stated that at that time power was running through secondary wires only, and that ordinary safety precautions had been taken.

Cast. D. F. Gutteridge of the Summerside R.C.M.P. detachment, in the absence of Dr. Zielinski read a statement from the doctor, who was first to arrive on the scene. In the doctor's opinion, death was instantaneous as a result of electric shock.

Mr. A. A. Scales, president of the power company gave evidence in support of the first witness. He said standard instructions for employees working on power lines are to take all precautions for safety, and added that just where to draw the line concerning the shut off of power, he was unable to say.

Members of the jury were: Wesley Foster, Foreman, James Inglis, Joseph Watson, Richard Kelly, Atinot Cotton, and Major Inglis, Mr. D. O. Stewart, Q.C., represented the crown.

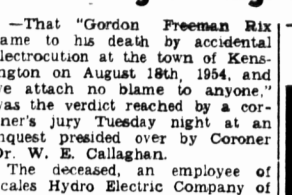

TERRORIST LEADER SHOT NAIROBI, Kenya (Reuters)—British troops have ambushed and shot to death the third-ranking leader of the Mau Mau terrorist cult, "field marshal" Elie Kisio, police reported here Friday. Soldiers of the Black Watch Regiment killed Kisio, 37, when he tried to shoot his way out of a trap in the Narok area, 70 miles west of here.

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
