

**NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.**

**HALIFAX.**

HALIFAX, July 31.  
Freeman Payzant, lobster dealer of Lockport, is reported in difficulties. Liabilities \$50,000.

Halifax Banking Co. has declared a half yearly dividend of 3 per cent.  
The Inland Revenue receipts for July at this port were \$13,540 and the Custom receipts \$30,948.92.

**OTTAWA.**

It is said that the tenders to be opened to-morrow for the 100 section of the Canada Pacific Railway west of Winnipeg will be submitted to the Privy Council as a whole, it having been determined to delay the commencement of the work.

**MONTREAL, July 31.**

The Star says: "The Consolidated has been relieved by other banks of nine out of its sixteen agencies."

"We understand that heavy demands have been made upon the head office to-day and which it was found impossible to meet. We regret therefore to have to say that it is quite probably the bank will not open its doors to-morrow."

On the other hand the stock closed to-day somewhat stronger, selling at 15 1/2 which would indicate that such information had not been obtained by brokers.

Your correspondent learns to-night that the Consolidated Bank will suspend to-morrow, and that some demands were refused this afternoon. This action was precipitated from lack of confidence in the statements of the Directors, arising out of disclosures in Asher's & Co.'s estate, to the effect that \$25,000 was due the bank by that firm and the character of other assets held by the bank. The feeling in business circles is very unsatisfactory.

Grimley's balloon, the "Canada," ascended at five o'clock. It was completely filled, containing 70,000 cubic feet of gas. Six persons were in it: Grimley, Cowan, Page, Moulton, of "Witness," Harper, of "Star," and Browning of "Herald." It took an easterly course as far as could be seen. Little effort was made with steering apparatus to change the course of the balloon.

At 6.30 balloon "Canada" passed over Chambly Canton in an easterly direction.

**ALEXANDRIA BAY, N. Y., July 31.**

A very sad accident occurred to-day at Clayton, 12 miles above here. The steamers "Farrington" and "Josephine," with an excursion party on each of them, started from the dock at 9.30 a.m., hitched together for company's sake. When about a hundred yards out the forward ropes broke, causing the boats to separate, which resulted in the capsizing of the steam yacht "Josephine," she being the smaller boat of the two. There were 25 passengers on board when she went down, 20 of whom were rescued by the "Farrington," but five of them never rose.

**NEW YORK, July 31.**

**LONDON, July 31.**

In the Commons to-day the Chancellor of the Exchequer stated that the Government proposed to ask a vote of £3,000,000 sterling on account of the expenses of the war in South Africa, which sum if not sufficient, would at all events suffice till the next session of Parliament. The new credit thus asked for will raise the expenditures for the Zulu war to £4,500,000. The Chancellor stated that the new credit would transfer the surplus estimated at the introduction of the Budget into a deficit of £1,163,000, but the Government hopes to recover this sum from the South African Colonies, and would ask authority to raise remainder by Exchequer bonds.

The "Globe" says a letter was lately received by Horatio N. J. Sprague, United States Consul at Gibraltar, demanding that \$3,000 be deposited in a certain spot, on pain of the death of himself and family in the event of his refusal. The Spanish authorities investigated the matter and arrested fourteen persons on suspicion. Mr. Sprague has since received a letter containing still more audacious threats.

A despatch from Paris says Osman Pasha has been appointed commander-in-chief of the army of observation on Greek frontier, which will number 84,000.
