DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

The Modus Vivendi Discussed

OTTAWA, May 4. The discussion in the Senate continues on the renewal of the Atlantic modus vivendi. Senator Power thought Canada had too long carried out the Scriptural injunction of turning the other cheek to the Yankees to be smitten. The treatment of our vessels in Behring Sea should be a pointer for us. The Government, in his opinion, was quite justified in abolishing the Atlantic modus. Premier Abbott said that not long ago the Opposition denounced the Government because there was no modus with the States. Now Mr. Power was complaining because the Government by this measure was simply endeavoring to keep peace. Canada derived many advantages from the modus vivendi, but he was not justified in saying what these advantages were. This was one method for preserving harmony with our neighbors and it was better for Canada to adopt a measure of this kind than friction to be continually arising. The bill only passed its second reading. The Dominion Health Institute has been organized. Rooms, M. P., was elected President, and Weldon Vice-President for New Brunswick; Borden, for Nova Scotia, and Howland for P. E. Island. In the Commons nothing of importance was done. The House went into Committee of Supply for discussing the canal estimates.

The Bank of England Rate.

LONDON, May 4. The reduction in the Bank of England rate made during the past week did not effect the money market. This is the first time since conversion of ounces that the Bank of England rate has been so low.

Battle in West Africa.

LONDON, May 4. Telegrams from the British West Africa Colony of Gambia received at the War Office, say that a British force consisting of 50 marines and 300 troops has captured Tonlataba after a spirited defense. Capt. Roberts, of the 1st West India regiment was wounded and died. Three others on the British side were severely wounded. The enemy's loss was heavy.

The Canadian Fisheries.

HALIFAX, May 3. Quebec—Fair catches of lobsters and few herring at Picoe, Grand River and New Port Point to-day. P. E. Island—Herring and lobsters reported very plentiful at Miminigash and a few taken on banks. Magdalen Islands—Herring still plentiful at Amherst Island, and lobsters fair at Grandentry. Cape Breton—Good catches of lobsters are being made at Port Hood, Louisbourg and Arichat, and herring fair at Port Hood, Stannus and St. Peter's. A few cod are being taken at Arichat and reported fair in Bras D'Or Lake. Nova Scotia—Lobsters good at Port Medway and fair at Whitehead, Isaac's Harbor, Liverpool and Gaspareaux reported stocking in Liverpool and at Digby. Good catches of cod and halibut are being made; also, a few herring and haddock bait. Herring bait by fishermen's net at Georgetown, P. E. I., and St. Ann's. Ice procurable at Georgetown, Arichat, Whitehead and Liverpool.

FROM HALIFAX.—The steamer Fastnet arrived at 9:30 o'clock this morning with a large cargo and James Anderson, J. D. Miller, and Mrs. Marshall and child as passengers. She left at 12 o'clock for Summerside, whence she will return to Charlottetown at daylight to-morrow morning, leaving again for Halifax at 4 o'clock in the afternoon.
