

Alcatraz Escapees Built Raft In Prison Workshop

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—The three bank robbers who escaped from prison on Alcatraz Island had improvised equipment they hoped would float them to freedom.

A source, whose name could not be disclosed, said the equipment, apparently made by the convicts themselves in prison workshops, had been hidden on the roof across which the three escaped.

Another report said a fourth convict who did not go with the others—but who was in on the planning—told investigators the three planned to float to shore on a postbox raft made of rain-coat sleeves.

The fourth convict, identified as Allen West, was in a cell next to that of one of the three. Two paddles were also found, the report continued. One was turned over by the coast guard to the FBI and the other found on Alcatraz.

Two swimmers from the San Francisco Olympic Club swam northward across the 1641 current from a point just off Alcatraz to Angel Island two miles away. They did it to prove a strong swimmer could make the difficult stretch.
