MONTREAL (CP)—Hector Decare, one of Canada's near-legendary strongmen, died Wednesday at his home here after a long illness. He was 74.

During his career he set weight-lifting records in international tournaments and was one of the fabled Louis Cyr's most formidable opponents. In 1912, Decare hoisted

However, Cyr performed the most spectacular feat when he crouched under a platform loaded with 2,879 pounds of iron weights and stood up with the platform on his shoulders. Decare couldn't budge the platform in three tries.

MONDAY

—Kinsman Dave Carnegie of the Summerside Kinsman Club returned last evening from Newfoundland where he was elected deputy governor of the four Maritime Provinces at No. 7 district convention. The Summerside delegation, returning with him, brought back the decision of the convention to hold the 1955 Kinsman district convention at Summerside.

Art MacKenzie of Charlottetown set an amateur record for the Belvedere Golf Course on Saturday afternoon when he shot a four-under-par 68 in the qualifying round for the Sport Lodge Trophy.

MacKenzie had twelve pars, five birdies and one bogey in his blistering round. He was playing in competition with Had MacLennan, Mac Kennedy and Irving Praught. The former amateur record for the course set during competition play was 69 shared by Professor Turner and Cecil Dowling, now the professional at the local club. Dowling set his record during the N. B.-P. E. I. Open several years ago.

Three young men and a girl maintained a lonely perch on a small raft in Charlottetown harbor yesterday afternoon for two hours before they were rescued by a motor boat when their predicament was called to the attention of the City Police and Fire Departments.

Isabel MacDonald, along with Ronnie MacDonald, George Joseph and Claude Thistle had decided to push their homemade raft of logs and boards a little further out from Langley Beach where the water would be deeper for swimming. It was soon found that the one oar with which they were equipped, was not sufficient to control the cumbersome craft, which continued to drift with the tide towards the harbor mouth.

At no time were any of the occupants in immediate danger but their anxiety increased when help failed to arrive. At last some residents of Langley Beach, realizing the predicament of the four, called the City Police, who arranged for a motor launch to take the stranded occupants back to the point from which they had started.

—The construction of an addition to Summerside High School, to provide eight additional classrooms at a cost of approximately \$108,000 was approved at a special meeting of the Town Council, last evening.

*The King's County Federation of Agriculture went on record as expressing its appreciation for the assistance obtained for the potato industry during the past year from the efforts of the Potato Marketing Board and the Federation of Agriculture in a unanimous resolution passed at the semi-annual meeting held at Morell last night. The largely attended meeting was presided over by the president, Mr. Ephraim Malone who welcomed the members to the meeting.

More than a hundred Island milk producers who met in Eldon Hall last night to discuss problems of the dairy industry, heard two important suggestions made by Mr.

Percy Simmonds of the Central Creameries, Charlottetown. Mr. Simmonds advised the producers to request the Provincial Government to place government milk testers in all creameries on the Island, and also to ask for the establishment of a milk board which would set the price of milk each month.

His proposal to have government milk-testers attached to all Island creameries, and also his suggestion about the establishment of a milk board were well received. He pointed out, too, that Upper Canadian interests were loath to see Island milk products gain a foothold in the Maritime market and were trying to prevent such a development.
