Construction Starts On New Morell Plant

Costing approximately \$725,000, construction has been started on the new butter and cheese factory at Morell which will replace the plant destroyed by fire in September. The new plant is expected to be completed in four months. The building measuring 83 by 110 feet, will have a full basement. The structure will be constructed of steel, cement blocks and an exterior wall of brick. The anticipated cost includes cost of new equipment.

ON MAIN FLOOR

The main floor will house the manager's office, central booker and the former Dundas keeping office, showroom, locker facilities for patrons, a large butter storage room, and curing and holding basins for cheese. The plant, which will be of very modern design, will have 1 1/2 acres, butter, and office area enclosed in glass. From the inside of the front door, it will be possible to see through the whole main floor.

The basement area will contain a boiler room refrigeration equipment, dry storage, and supply area. An escalator system will be used to move supplies from the basement to the processing room.

The manager and three directors of the organization visited two Ontario establishments to gather ideas for the Morell plant. Peter A. McNeil, Charlottetown, is the architect, with J.P. Pielan, Charlottetown, as general contractor.

While waiting for construction to finish on the new plant, a building in Morell is being equipped for the manufacture of butter. The plant is being readied for the manufacturing of butter.

Some 60 girls and boys representing 22 of the high schools in the province, along with 15 teacher sponsors attended the annual high school Red Cross conference at the Basilica Recreation Centre Saturday. Nancy George of Queen Charlotte High School, Charlottetown, presided at the morning and afternoon sessions when delegates were welcomed by Gordon MacDonald, president of the P.E.I. Red Cross.

The keynote speaker, Ralph Wendeborn, Toronto national director of Junior Red Cross, was introduced to the gathering by Dr. A.K. Parker, chairman of the province's Junior Red Cross advisory committee.

In challenging young people Mr. Wendeborn said that there must be growth in character and personality as well as physical growth. He said for example that our sense of responsibility must be linked to a series of circles beginning with self and reaching out from there to family, school, community, country and to the world community at large. He pointed out that the provinces are working with teachers providing young people with the opportunity to develop this sense of responsibility and an awareness of the needs of others.

Mr. Wendeborn addressed the delegates under the film "Discovery" produced by the American Red Cross which unfolds the story of community and international services open to high school students through the avenue of Red Cross.

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Cumberland MP Says Maritimes Betrayed

Prime Minister Person has betrayed the Maritimes, said Robert C. Coates, MP for Cumberland, as he spoke at a meeting of the 1st Queens Progressive Conservative Association Saturday night. He said that \$12,000,000 (the cost of another general election) would be a bargain price for the removal of the Pearson government.

Lashing hard at the Liberal administration in Ottawa, Mr. Coates said, "In almost every action that the present government has taken, we (the Maritimes) have suffered rather than benefited from the results."

"A government that would consider for a second the closing of an airbase that has become such an integral part of the economy of this area is one that has neither special plans nor hopes for the area, and the P.E.I. government is a project the government is trying its best to have the people forget," he said.

Mr. Coates also blasted the principle of designated areas, the government's handling of agriculture here, and the Atlantic Development Board, a body which he said is being set up from its original concept to block the overall revitalization of our area to one of a gap filler."
