An English Pompeii.

LONDON, Jan. 2.—A British Pompeii has just been discovered near Reading, in Berkshire, on the great Strathfieldsays estate of the Duke of Wellington. It is a true city, and not a mere camp, and when fully excavated, will throw light upon the domestic life of our remote ancestors of more than 1000 years ago. The whole area has been free from all building operations ever since the Roman occupation of Britain; in fact, the soil is virgin, having been pasture land for centuries. An exhibition will be opened at Burlington House, Piccadilly, within a few days, which will present features of extraordinary interest. On the walls will be hung a huge plan of the buried city, marking the whereabouts of the streets, walls, gates, houses, baths, temples, forum and basilica. The excavations have brought to light the remains of a house ornamented with mosaic floors and containing rooms heated by hypocausts. Among the articles to be exhibited are pots, bowls, combs, bronze utensils, fragments of good glass vessels, pieces of iron work, chiefly tools, including carpenter's planes, chisels, axes, hammers, gouges, anvils and some edged tools, sharp enough to have cut their way for ten centuries, to work with now. The city was laid out with great regularity in squares like Salisbury and Winchester in mediæval times. There is a piece of tile upon which a baby must have trodden while the clay of which it is formed lay drying in the brickmaker's yard. The prints of the little toes are distinct, and the entire foot is perfectly marked. There are very fair specimens of pottery, from coarse belic ware to delicately moulded vessels embellished with artistic designs of human and animal figures and symbolic devices. There are two sets of human bones, skeletons of immature infants or dwarfs, as also needles and other articles of household use. Among these it is curious to note a key ring and other toilet and table requisites much resembling those in present use. There is one bangle almost a fac-simile of those worn in India and seen in our jewellers shops to-day.

BISMARCK'S FALL.

The London Times sets All Europe by the Ears.

LONDON, Jan. 2.—A profound sensation was caused all over Europe to-day by the following story, published and guaranteed to be authentic, by the London Times:— "France now begins, for the first time, to understand the cause of Bismarck's fall, and the circumstances, unknown until the late, which accompanied it. All these revelations are such that the ex-chancellor's bitterest enemies hardly venture to discuss what a shadow he cast in his descent from power over the brilliant, the iron rule of Bismarck. He had of late been an obstacle, an embarrassment and a cause of irritation to everybody, and a great difficulty in the dispatch of public affairs. Latterly he had seen none of the ministers, of whom he was the chief, had listened to none of their objections, and gave positive and definite orders, as if the opinions of his associates in the government were of no value. He was almost inaccessible and received those only whom his caprice invited round him.

HE TOLERATED NO OBJECTION. He listened with a condescending smile, which condemned beforehand the ideas submitted to him by his young master, the Emperor. He even ceased, restly, to work, while complaining bitterly if the slightest decision was come to without consulting him, and yet professed himself overwhelmed with labor when over-ruled. His ministers were sent to him to sign. He had become a terror to all who were obliged to come near him. Nobody ventured to contradict him, even Emperor William II, saw him only occasionally, because his majesty was afraid of disturbing or irritating him, and yet professed himself over-ruled with labor when over-ruled. He was a pupil—now his master—confronted the fact that he was not master, but only chief servant. The long restrained imperial discontent broke into open quarrel on a minor question, and poured forth in such a torrent that the chancellor taken by surprise and disconcerted, suddenly said: "Then I can only offer your majesty my resignation." The Emperor was silent, and Bismarck withdrew. Two hours afterward, the resignation not having arrived, the emperor sent an aide de camp. The chancellor greeted him very affably, being convinced that the emperor wished him to return, and reconsider his idea of resignation; but to Bismarck's horror and surprise, the aide de camp had been sent to demand his written resignation. The prince, very uneasy, made the lame excuse of not having yet drawn it up, and deferred the matter till the morrow. Next morning the aide de camp reappeared. This time Bismarck was calmer, but again made the same excuse, saying that before preparing a written resignation he was bound to pay a visit. Accordingly he did pay a visit, which, incredible as it may appear, we can vouch for was to the Empress Frederick.

YES, IN A PANIC AT HIS FALL, this man who, but the day before had been the great chancellor, now staggered before her whom he had so long humbled and explained the danger to the empire involved in his fall, and the fatal consequences which the young Emperor risked in this overturning of the founder of the empire. He begged her majesty to intervene and prevent the disaster to Germany, and the remorse that her sovereign would feel at this unmerited humiliation of his most faithful servant. The Emperor heard him out. She saw, humiliating himself before her, the man who had hated implacably her husband and herself, and who had sown distrust between father and son. No doubt she enjoyed the spectacle of seeing at her feet this bitter enemy, now dismissed by the very son whom he had reckoned on making his tool again, and in a single sentence, becoming an Empress, a mother and a woman, she returned to this cringing diplomat all the insults he had cast upon her.

"I much regret being quite powerless. I should have been extremely glad to intervene with my son in your favor, but you so employed all your power in estranging his heart from me, making his mind foreign to mine, that I can only witness your fall without being able to ward it off. When you are no longer there, my son will perhaps draw me over to me, but then it will be too late for me to help you." The prince withdrew with down-cast head, and, returning home, found the aide-de-camp, who, for the fourth time, had come for his resignation which the fallen statesman handed to him.
