## Birchwood's Cadets Are Warmly Praised

"This corps is much more staid than I thought any corps could be," Col. A.W. Rogers, of the 2nd Militia Group said following his inspection of No. 148 Birchwood High School Cadet Corps yesterday.

Also high in his praise of the corps was Captain J. J. MacDonald, headquarters area cadet training officer.

Captain MacDonald told the corps members he had always heard of the cadet corps in Charlottetown but this was the first opportunity he had of seeing one of them.

"I have seen many cadet corps," the Captain said, "and there are few better than the corps I have seen here today."

## Catholic Welfare Bureau Used By 195 Families During Year

One hundred and ninety-five families totalling 963 people sought some form of service during the year from the Catholic Welfare Bureau. Sister Mary Henry, the executive director, reported last night to the annual meeting.

"There are three basic predominant causes why these families find themselves in trouble—alcoholism, poor housing and lack of adequate income. These problems need to be attacked on a much wider base than that of which any one private agency is capable."

"This is one of our main functions as a private agency—to demonstrate needs to public agencies," the report stated.

The meeting was held in St. Pius X parish hall. President Dr. A.L. McIsaac presided and delivered the report to the board of directors.

1908. The rolling fields and meadows which now become a memorial to him, were his favorite haunts in boyhood days and it was always pleasure for him to visit the old homestead in the later years of his life.

As a lad, the famous Islander attended the public district school and later Prince of Wales College. He proceeded to McGill University where he graduated in medicine and did post graduate work at London University from which he emerged as a member of the Royal College of Surgeons.

After practicing medicine on the staff of two Montreal Hospitals, he was chosen as professor of History of Medicine at McGill.

He was the founder and editor of University Magazine. He wrote many essays which were given prominence in leading publications in Canada and overseas. He was a regular contributor for many years to the famous Blackwoods Magazine where his articles were featured.

In the vicinity of \$500,000 will have been spent on this survey which contrasts sharply with the \$6,000 spent by the former Liberal administration."
