Grit Ingenuity.

WHEN the affairs of Canada were managed by Sir John A. McDonald and his party, the Grit majority in the Nova Scotia Legislature contrived to deprive his supporters in that Province of a few votes, by passing a Law which disfranchised all Dominion Government employees.

The following, from the Herald, will explain the contrivance:—

"On Friday evening last some thirty-two more men were 'dismissed' from the Railway Department at Halifax. While in the Department these men had no votes. Of course not being any longer in the Railway Department their electoral privileges revive. The arrangement is a very simple one. The men are 'dismissed'—for a month. They will get no salary—for a month. They will not be taken back—for a month. They are therefore placed in a position to swear that they are not in Government employ; that they have not received any pay, and so on. It is a very ingenious arrangement. City Council.

A meeting of the City Council was held last evening. Present: the Mayor, Councillors Peake, Stumbles, Davy, Hertz, Hooper, Beer, Horn, Koughan, Byrne and Morris.

The following gentleman were re-appointed unanimously:—W. B. Morrison, City Clerk; F. S. Moore, City Treasurer; Wm. Shepperd, Collector.

It was moved by Councillor Beer, seconded by Councillor Davy, that George Douglass be appointed City Surveyor.

Councillor Stumbles moved in amendment, seconded by Councillor Horne, that Walter Lowe be appointed.

Councillor Byrne moved, seconded by Councillor Koughan, in amendment to the amendment, that James McNally be re-appointed.

Councillor Hooper moved in amendment to the amendment to the amendment, that Henry B. Smith be appointed.

Councillor Hooper's amendment was lost. The Council then divided as follows on Councillor Byrne's amendment: Nays—Councillors Stumbles, Davy, Beer, Horne, Hertz—5; Ayes—Councillors Peake, Morris, Byrne, Koughan, Hooper—5. The Mayor gave his casting vote against the amendment. Councillor Stumbles' amendment that Walter Lowe be appointed was then carried on the following division: Ayes—Councillors Byrne, Koughan, Hooper, Horne, Peake, Stumbles,—6; Nays—Councillors Morris, Davy, Hertz, Beer—4.

Councillor Beer gave notice of reconsideration.

Councillor Morris moved, seconded by Councillor Hertz, that no notice be served on Mr. Lowe till after next meeting of Council.

The motion was lost on the following division: Nays—Couns. Stumbles, Peake, Horne, Hooper, Byrne, Koughan—6; Ayes—Couns. Davy, Hertz, Beer, Morris—4.

James Doolan was re-appointed lamp-lighter.

It was moved by Councillor Stumbles that the Stipendiary Magistrate be informed that the Council desires to have the police force reduced to a marshal, bailiff, messenger and ten men; and that the Council will only assume the responsibility of paying the salaries now fixed, and that the members of the force shall hereafter find their own clothes. Carried.

Arthur O'Neill was re-appointed inspector of bread.

The report of the Committee on tenders was then read, recommending that the tender of James Barclay for extending Pownal Wharf at \$11 per foot be accepted, it being the lowest of eight tenders.

It was ordered to be laid on the table until the report of the Finance Committee is received.

A petition was read from the secretary of the Hillsborough Boating Club requesting that Pownal wharf be hired to the club for the purpose of erecting a grand stand thereon. The petition was laid on the table.

A petition was read from certain rate-payers recommending that Alfred S. Grant be appointed Park Keeper.

Councillor Byrne moved, seconded by Councillor Koughan, that Patrick Sweeney be appointed Park Keeper.

It was moved in amendment by Councillor Morris and seconded by Councillor Peake, that Henry Curtis be re-appointed to this office.

It was moved in amendment to the amendment by Councillor Beer and seconded by Councillor Davy that Daniel Gordon be appointed.

An amendment was moved by Councillor Stumbles and seconded by Councillor Hooper that Thomas Shaidow be appointed. This, on being put, was lost. Councillor Beer's amendment was then put and lost by the casting vote of the Mayor. Councillor Morris' motion was then carried.

The Council adjourned sine die.

Mrs. Mattie G. Smith delivered her lecture on the "Northwest" to a thin audience in the Y.M.C.A. Hall last evening. The lecture was very interesting.

We call attention to the extract of Senator Haviland's speech, delivered in the Rink on Monday night last. When Senator Haviland stated that he would use his influence to haul from office such men as the Local Premier, the Minister of Public Works and Hon. John Robertson because of the improper use they have made of their power. We believe he sounded the death knell of the Local Government. We regret very much that the Secretary of the meeting was not able to send a report in time for insertion in to-day's issue:—

Gentlemen,—Their is one matter which I wish to speak about in connection with to-day's proceedings, EVERY GRIT MEMBER OF THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT was upon the platform at Mr. McKenzie's meeting. There was the Speaker of the House of Assembly, Mr. Beer, who, if he properly appreciated his position, would not be found mixing himself in party politics; The Local Premier, Mr. Davies; the Minister of Public Works, Mr. Stewart; Mr. John Robertson and others. On the School Question I voted for these gentlemen, and did my utmost to have them returned; but to-day I find that these men are acting like political demagogues and betraying the trust which myself and other Liberal-Conservatives have placed in them. To-morrow morning I would use my influence to have them driven from office, not for what they have done to-day, but because of their incompetency. They unjustly taxed the country. They have disregarded every wish of the electors. They burdened the Island with a huge Lunatic Asylum far too large and costly for this Colony; and have altogether mismanaged the affairs of the country. Never has such an incompetent set of men ruled as those whom I have mentioned. The Minister of Public Works was in this meeting to-night and I care not if he is here now. I repeat what I have said, they are totally unfit to represent us.
