THOMAS S. JUDAH, a Montreal justice of the peace, has been arrested and placed under bail, to answer the charges of obtaining \$25,000 from G. B. Burland under false pretences, by giving a mortgage on property, which he represented to be owned by him individually, but of which he is only a five-eighths owner. His arrest has caused a sensation, as both Judah and Burland are members of prominent and respected families in Montreal.

SKIPPED OUT.—Davis, the soap man, "skipped out" from the Royal last night, leaving two weeks board unpaid for himself and female companion. The pair made free with the value of another boarder, opened it, extracted therefrom some \$70 in cash and a revolver, and departed. They managed their getting off very cleverly, and so far no clue has been obtained as to the direction they took. They did not go aboard of any of the trains which went out last night.—Moncton Transcript.

The mortal remains of Mr. Leo Harrington, printer, were followed to their last resting place to-day by a large concourse of mourning friends. Few of his fellow printers were absent, the offices of the Herald and THE EXAMINER, in which he was long employed, being largely represented. The gap left by Mr. Harrington is the first which, for many years, death has made in the ranks of our printing fraternity; and little more than a week ago he was a strong man. His absence will be much felt in THE EXAMINER's office; for he was industrious, capable, obliging, and a great favorite of his companions. His young, bereaved wife has the sympathy of all who knew him.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Railway Smash Up in the Dark.

TORONTO, Sept. 25. Three Pullman cars and the private car of Chief Engineer Hannaford, of the Grand Trunk express for Montreal and Boston, left the track near Pickering Station last night, owing to a broken frog, and went over an embankment twenty-five feet high. At the time of the accident it was very dark, and rain was pouring in torrents. The crash of the cars and the screams of the passengers in the darkness were terrible. The flames burned Hannaford's coach, and communicated to the Pullman, but was there arrested. Strange to relate, only some dozen of persons were injured, none fatally. No one was killed, and many absolutely escaped without a scratch. One coach was smashed into kindling wood. The damage to the track and rolling stock is estimated at \$100,000.

Russian Affairs.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 25.

The Journal De St. Petersburg states Russia has joined with the other Powers in objecting to the suspension of the Egyptian Sinking Fund, and the Russian Government has expressed to England their regret that England did not consult the other Powers before deciding to authorize such a step.

Russia is about to build two iron-clad Sebastopol. These will serve as a nucleus for her future fleet in the Black Sea.

Lynch Law.

BROOKHAVEN, MISS., Sept. 21.

Last night a mob of forty men visited Franklin County jail, overpowered the jailer, and took out four negro prisoners and lynched them to trees in the court house yard.

VIRGINIA CITY, MONTANA, Sept. 25.

The bodies of two horse thieves were discovered suspended from a tram on Poplar River yesterday. This makes thirty-seven thieves lynched by vigilantes this season.

A Disastrous Fire.

PITTSBURG, PA., Sept. 25.

A disastrous fire broke out on the south side, at half past ten to-night, and at midnight was still raging. Abell Smith & Co.'s extensive glass works, together with Robinson & Co.'s machine shops and five frame buildings have already been consumed, and it is feared the flames will get beyond control. Fortunately the wind is light. The loss so far is estimated at \$200,000.

The Powers Protesting.

CAIRO, Sept. 25.

Diplomatic representatives of Germany, Austria and Russia called separately upon Nubar Pasha, Prime Minister, to-day, and presented an identical note to him. In this the powers make a formal protest against the action of the Egyptian Government in diverting the revenues set apart for the sinking fund to the general Egyptian treasury.

Franco-Chinese Difficulty.

LONDON, Sept. 25.

The Times' special from Shanghai says the German Government has instructed its Consuls and Naval Commanders to maintain an independent attitude during the continuance of the Franco-Chinese difficulties. It is feared, however, that complications may arise which may prevent German neutrality.

Steamer Sunk.

LIVERPOOL, Sept. 25.

The British steamer Lake Champlain, which left Quebec on the 11th of September, sunk at her dock here, last night, a sea-cock having been left open. The water in her is fourteen feet deep.

The Liquor License Argument.

OTTAWA, Sept. 25.

Before the Supreme Court to-day, the Dominion Liquor License case argument for the provinces was concluded by Attorney General Davies, of British Columbia.

In English:—Orthography, Writing from Dictation, Parsing and Analysis, Outlines of English and Canadian History, and General Geography.

The Scholarship is of the annual value of \$125, and will be tenable for three years. Candidates must send in their names to the undersigned on or before 1st May, 1885, when they will be daily informed of date and place of examination.
