HIGHWAY AND LIQUOR ACT VIOLATIONS

Magistrate At Alberton Handles Heavy Docket

ALBERTON — An unusually heavy docket of 60 cases confronted Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald at Alberton yesterday. Most cases involved Highway Traffic Act and Liquor Control Act charges.

Lesage's Tour Seen Of Aid To Pearson

OTTAWA (CP) — Guy Favreau, Quebec leader of the federal Liberals, said here Premier Jean Lesage's current speaking tour in the West will help the Pearson government's campaign for re-election.

Premier Lesage said repeatedly his Western tour is non-political and that the Quebec provincial Liberal party intends to stay out of the Nov. 8 federal election.

At a press conference closing a Liberal strategy meeting here, Mr. Favreau was asked whether Mr. Lesage's tour will help or hinder federal Liberal candidates in the West.

"No," the Privy Council president replied gravely.

"No what?" a reporter asked.

When the original question was repeated Mr. Favreau said: "Oh, yes, I think it will help our campaign."

Finance Minister Gordon, who also attended the press conference as Liberal campaign chairman, agreed.

Mr. Gordon said everybody at

the party meeting agreed it was a good year for Prime Minister Pearson to begin his campaigning slowly, making few political appearances.

Mr. Pearson gave the keynote address Tuesday but has no campaign speeches scheduled until the end of this month.

Mr. Gordon said more than \$1,000 was collected by girls who passed the hat at the party luncheon after Mr. Pearson spoke. He said there were 365 delegates present, mostly outgoing MPs, senators, new candidates and officials from liberal headquarters.

Asked how much the election campaign would cost, he said nobody knows the exact amount. "We don't think money wins elections," the finance minister said.

Mr. Favreau said an official Liberal candidate will be named by Mr. Pearson to run in St. Jean — Iberville — Naperville against Yvon Dupuis, dismissed from the cabinet last January and scheduled to stand trial next month on charges connected with an alleged payoff for a racetrack franchise.

There would be no nominating convention because there was no federal organization as yet in Mr. Dupuis, riding. He said provisional party associations have been set up in the 74 other Quebec constituencies.
