FRANCE IN MADAGASCAR.  
Great Britain to be Granted the Benefit of  
the Most Favored Nation Clause.

PARIS, March 29.—An official communi-  
cation has just been issued relative to the  
statement by Mr. Curzon in the British  
house of commons yesterday. Mr. Curzon  
made the announcement in regard to the  
annulment of existing treaties with Madaga-  
scar; that it was a subject of extreme  
importance. When the English govern-  
ment had received official notice of this  
action, he said they would take proper  
steps to protect British interests.  
The French government in its official  
note asserts that France occupies in Madaga-  
scar a special position and that it is  
entitled to special treatment in conse-  
quence. France will accordingly grant to  
Great Britain in Madagascar the benefit of  
the most favored nation clause so far as  
other nations are concerned. France will  
not, however, give Great Britain the benefit  
of the most favored nation clause if it is  
interpreted to mean that Great Britain will  
be accorded the same commercial rights  
in Madagascar as are accorded to the  
French government. France, in other  
words, will insist upon being the "most  
favored nation."

England's promptness with Germany  
two months ago has not been without its  
effect upon France. Long forbearance  
on the part of the Mother country had  
deceived her neighbors, and none of them  
more than France. Consequently, when-  
ever any little difficulty arose between  
England and France the people of the  
latter country began at once to "fight."  
But they are now disposed to discuss  
such matters in better temper. If the  
Dugongs expedition had been resolved upon  
before the flying squadron was made  
up, France would probably have wanted  
war.

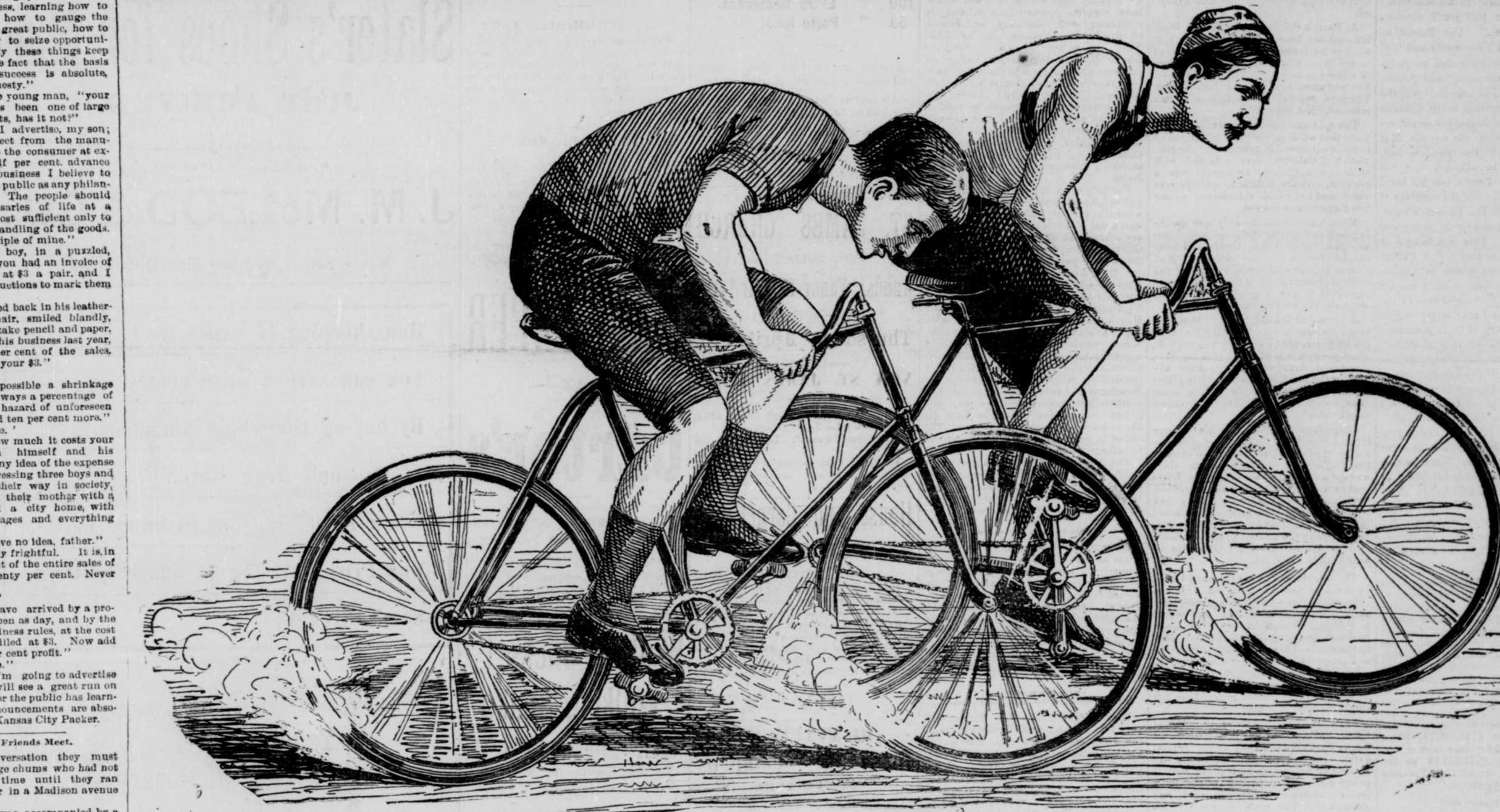
