Man Will Get Seeing-eye Dog

QUEBEC (CP) — Marcel Baril, 35, who has been blind since the age of 12, wrote last summer to a Quebec theatre group asking for a seeing-eye dog. He will receive it in February.

"It's something I never expected and never could have afforded," Baril said Monday when The Musical Theatre Company said they were turning over the proceeds of a recent production to pay for Baril's dog, his train fare to and from Montreal, N. J., where he will receive the dog and learn to use it.

Baril said he will never forget the day he lost the sight of one eye when it was pierced by a nail he was removing from a tire. In two months' overwork he strained away sight from the other eye.

Since then he has scraped a meagre living selling mops he made himself and working on the farm of a relative at nearby Deschambault. He earned enough three years ago to train a police dog, but I never expected the real thing."

Charles Kinnear and Cynthia Parker who head the theatre involved blind persons last June to apply in writing for a seeing-eye dog that would be paid for by the proceeds from their first musical production "Mississippi". Baril was the only applicant.

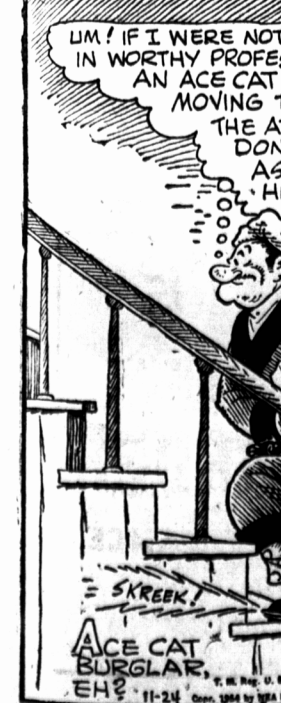

Tobacco Company Head Hits Back At Cancer Claims

NEW YORK (AP) — The president of the Reynolds Tobacco Company maintains that there still isn't "a single shred of substantial evidence" to link cigarette smoking and lung cancer directly.

This assertion came at a luncheon Monday from E. A. Darr, whose firm manufactures Camel, Winston and Cavalier cigarettes.

Darr said:

"I state flatly that up to this date the anti-cigarette proponents have not advanced a single shred of substantial evidence to support their theory but have, instead, relied upon assumptions based on the association idea."

Reporting on Darr's speech this morning, the Wall Street Journal viewed it as a claim that the American Cancer Society was attempting to destroy the tobacco industry.

The journal said it was the first time the head of a big tobacco firm has singled out the Cancer Society for criticism and interpreted this as a tipoff that cigarette makers will fight further efforts to link cigarettes with lung cancer.

NEW YORK (AP) — The American Cancer Society, replying to criticism from a large cigarette manufacturer, said Tuesday "we centre our attack only on cancer... regardless of where the chips fall."

The society's medical and scientific director, Dr. Charles S. Cameron said the ACS find itself "in large and growing company" of investigators who have reached the conclusion that "an association exists between cigarette smoking and lung cancer."

2,000 New Yorkers View Body of Andrei Vishinsky

NEW YORK, (AP)—More than 2,000 New Yorkers and scores of diplomats viewed the body of Andrei Y. Vishinsky Tuesday before the start of his last journey home to Moscow and a hero's funeral.

Once an obscure diplomat and later the chief prosecutor of a Stalin blood purge, Vishinsky in death was surrounded by a pomp more often seen at the bier of royalty than that of a professed proletarian.
