

Transport Men Are Advised To Get Into Step With Needs

 LAC BEAUPORT, Que. (CP) — One of Canada's top economic planners, J. J. Deutsch of the Economic Council of Canada, told Canadian transportation men to get into step with the new economic needs of their country, needs which give smaller place than formerly to railroads but as big a place as ever to the fast flow of transportation.

But most of the talk among economists, engineers and other transport experts who founded their own talking forum here in a two-day meeting was still about the rail system on which Canada was built.

Dr. Deutsch did not deny the importance of the train in creating Canada. "The transcontinental railway made this country a reality," he said in his keynote address.

But now the family car and the passenger plane have revolutionized transport. It's not the federal government, the sponsor of rail-laying, which now pays sealed from rail to truck to the big government bill in transport, but the provinces and municipalities that pave the roads, he said.

U.S. Immigrant Ceiling Planned

WASHINGTON (CP) — A move to stick an annual immigrant ceiling of 120,000 persons on Canada and the other Western Hemisphere countries has been approved by the full U.S. Senate judiciary committee.

The vote was 14 to 2 and the lack of any United States government opposition indicated the move may get full congressional support barring a revolt by northern liberals in both the Democratic and Republican parties.

"We will try anything, but we want to reduce our risks as much as possible. The CN's policy is to run passenger services with an over-all profit, keeping trains which stand a chance of paying their costs. The only element we can play around with is right now is prices."

This, he said, was the origin of the company's red, white and blue system of fare-staggering.

Toronto manufacturers' representative G. Alté told how the CN's express branch had "eliminated many more handlings and improved delivery in some cases by days" by using containers which can be transferred still sealed from rail to truck to the big government bill in transport, but the provinces and municipalities that pave the roads, he said.

William Bailey and J. M. Dessert of the Aluminum Company of Canada said the sanitary lightness of aluminum is making it more and more popular as a material for building hopper and tank cars to carry everything from ore to food.

Opening lead — six of hearts.
 It is not always easy to pinpoint the exact cause of the trouble when something goes wrong with the bidding. For example, take this hand played in the match between Italy and United States during the First World Olympiad in 1960. The Italians would up with a profit of 1,180 points on the deal, each of the American pairs contributing heavily to the disaster.

At the first table, the Italian pair, Avarelli and Belladonna, got in six hearts doubled in the manner shown and overtrick. Without the double they would have scored 1,460 points instead of the 1,860 points they actually got.

The opening heart bid by Belladonna, instead of the more normal bid of a diamond, was in accordance with the usual style of the Roman pair, who generally bid the short suit before the long suit.

There is no doubt that in this particular hand the method worked well, especially since it enticed a double from West, who had no idea that Belladonna had a secret weapon in the form of an excellent six-card diamond suit.

At the second table, with an American pair now North-South, the bidding went:

South West North East
 1 ♠ Pass 2 ♥ Dble
 4 ♥ 4 ♣ Pass Pass
 5 ♠ Dble 5 ♥

The two heart responses, as used by this particular pair, showed a poor hand with little to recommend it except heart length. The hearts themselves did not have to be as strong as they actually were, and might, for example, have consisted of the 10-8-x-x-x instead.

Perhaps the fear that this was the case was what restrained South from undertaking what turned out to be an excellent slam contract. Either the method of bidding was at fault, or else South's judgement was had in shying away from the slam.

New Coal Mine Was Started Friday, 13th

SPRINGHILL, N.S. (CP) — The newest mine to be opened in this hard-luck coal town is a two-man operation that was started Friday, Aug. 13.

The mine, now 20 feet below the surface and into coal, is owned by Springhill Coal Mines Ltd. William Mattix and Kenneth Smith say they have worked 10 hours a day, seven days a week, since Aug. 13 to bring the mine into production.

Another mine, this one employing 110 men, has been operating in the town for some time. The last major mining operation was closed down in 1958 when an underground upheaval in No. 2 colliery here killed 75 miners.

Prior to that, in 1954, the other major pit, No. 4, was sealed off after an explosion and fire claimed 37 lives.
