

STEAM NAVIGATION COMPANY.

The second Annual Meeting of the Shareholders of the P. E. Island Steam Navigation Company was held this day in the upper room of the Court House—Charles Hensley, Esq., in the Chair.

After reading the minutes of the last year's meeting, the Chairman proceeded to read the Directors' Report for the past year, as follows:—

REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS OF THE PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND STEAM NAVIGATION COMPANY.

GENTLEMEN; Although the expiration of another year calls upon us to render to you an account of our proceedings during its progress, and to bring under your consideration such matters as we may think conducive to the general advancement of the Company's affairs, it would have been more satisfactory, we think, to all parties, if the necessity of making this Report could have been delayed for a short period, as it is, under present circumstances, somewhat incomplete and unsatisfactory, by our being without any information of the intentions of the Legislatures of the neighbouring Provinces with respect to the applications which we have deemed it to be our duty to address to them on behalf of the Company; and until we receive communications from them we are incapacitated from making any certain statement upon matters both interesting and important to the success of our enterprise. Whenever these documents arrive, opportunity will be taken to put the Shareholders in possession of their contents, and also of the views and intentions of the Directors with respect to, and in consequence of them.

In the mean time, we must content ourselves with stating to you the character of the applications which have been forwarded to the Governments of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, with such other particulars and comments as the occasion demands.

The Directors, in July last, published, for your information, the correspondence which had taken place in consequence of the information they had received of the unsatisfactory position in which the Company had been placed by the untoward determination of the Legislative Council of the Province of New Brunswick, in opposition to the vote of the Hon. the House of Assembly. We have felt it incumbent upon us to forward other Memorials and urgent representations to the different branches of the Legislature of New Brunswick, and we are happy in being able to report to you, that we have received assurances that justify a reasonable expectation that our present applications will have a more favourable result than our previous ones.

The application made to the Government of Nova Scotia, you are aware, was responded to by a vote of £200, Halifax Currency, for the year 1843; but as no notice was taken of our prayer for remuneration for services performed in 1842, the Directors made a representation of the circumstance to His Excellency Lord Viscount Falkland to the following effect:—

"To His Excellency Lord Viscount Falkland, Lieut. Governor, &c. &c. of Nova Scotia.

"The Memorial of the Directors of the P. E. Island Steam Navigation Company, sheweth—

"That whilst the Memorialists desire most thankfully to acknowledge the favourable grant which the Legislature of Nova Scotia has been pleased to make to the Proprietors of the St. George, for the ensuing season, they are constrained, by the absence of all notice or information of the intentions of the Legislature of Nova Scotia, with respect to that part of their Memorial of February last which adverted to the services performed by the St. George during the last year, again to solicit attention to the following representation:—

"That the St. George commenced her operations for the season on the 15th of August, 1842, and continued to run weekly between Pictou and Miramichi—and as often as the weather and other circumstances would admit, touching at Pictou twice in the week—until the end of the month of November. That the St. George was employed in this service at a very great expense to the Proprietors, in the expectation that this Company would be entitled thereby to the remuneration proffered by the Legislature of Nova Scotia for such services.

"It is true that the grant is made to the Pocahontas, she being on the station at that time, as the present grant is made to the St. George; but it may be presumed that if the St. George should be withdrawn, and a more efficient Steamboat substituted, the Legislature of Nova Scotia would not object to the claim upon that account. The Memorialists do, therefore, with all respect, beg to submit their present application to the consideration of your Excellency, with a view to the obtaining payment to them, on account of the St. George, of such surplus of the grant ordered to the Pocahontas as she failed to acquire a title to by lapse of service, and also of such portion of the £50 offered in addition to effect a communication between Pictou and Miramichi—therein specified at once a fortnight, but which the St. George performed every week, and your Memorialists will ever pray."

This was accompanied by a statement of the number of trips, &c. &c.

To which His Excellency returned the following answer:—

"Government House, Halifax, 6th June, 1843.
"Sir; I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your Excellency's communication of the 15th of May, with a Memorial from the Prince Edward Island Steam Navigation Company, which I will cause to be laid before the House of Assembly at the next Session of the Legislature of this Province, not having at present any funds at my disposal to enable me to comply with the prayer of the Petition.

The Memorials presented to our own Legislature received that considerate and enlightened attention which has distinguished all its proceedings with respect to this public enterprise, and the private Shareholders are, by its liberal disposition, placed in circumstances of increased advantage, whenever the swelling tide of Commercial prosperity shall revisit these Provinces.

Having, during the Winter season, effected such necessary repairs and alterations as the experience of the previous Summer had shown to be requisite to the general accommodation of passengers, and conducive to the efficiency of the vessel—alterations which successfully accomplished the purposes and objects for which they were undertaken; and as the Directors feel assured that the prevailing desire is to render the St. George as actively serviceable to the public as is compatible with her safety, they felt it incumbent on them to bring her into operation as soon as the state of the ice and the general aspect of the weather permitted. Disregarding, therefore, the mere requirements of the Acts of the several Legislatures, the St. George was dispatched on her first voyage to Pictou on the 27th of April, and to Miramichi on the 5th of May.

It has been a source of much satisfaction to the Directors that the St. George was able to perform her appointed voyages during the last season with so much regularity, notwithstanding some very unexpected interruptions that are not likely, we trust, to occur again.

It would be a still greater subject of congratulation, if they could, with equal truth, state to you that the returns of the past year offered an adequate remuneration for the services performed and the risk and anxiety incurred; but they are obliged, however unwillingly, to inform you, that if all the grants and sums of money which the Company lays claim to were fully paid up, after making the necessary payments to the Reserved and Insurance funds, there would be no balance applicable to the payment of a dividend to the Shareholders. The Directors, however, trust that the representations which they have made, and will continue to make, as opportunity occurs, will induce, on the part of the several Legislatures, a more liberal consideration of the claims of this Company, and that, by new arrangements, with respect to the frequency of the St. George's voyages to

Miramichi, and other alterations not yet determined upon, the coming year will result in a more satisfactory report from the Treasurer than he is able to present to you upon the present occasion.

Discouraging as this statement, with respect to pecuniary matters, must be allowed to be, and disappointing to our reasonable expectations, there is, nevertheless, one almost redeeming consolation in the assurance that the public is deriving, and we hope will continue to derive, incalculable advantages from the existence of this Company; and from the regular and commodious communication it has established, by means of its vessel, with the neighbouring Provinces, and through one of them, with England.

Excluded by her insular position from becoming the ordinary route of visitors to these comparatively unexplored countries, the very existence of Prince Edward Island might become a problem, if she failed to assert her claim to consideration, by making this one strenuous effort to maintain a station in the general estimation.

The great extent of unimproved land of the best character for Agricultural enterprise; the great facilities of water communication, and other advantages, which this neglected Island is acknowledged to possess, needs but to be made known, to secure to her that attention which is so necessary to her advancement; and one of the requisite instruments for attracting and facilitating that attentive observation and opportunity for examination, by which the advantages and peculiarities of the Island may be made known, is a Steamboat of such power and accommodation as may offer a safe and pleasant means of transport to visitors and travellers of all descriptions.

You will, perhaps, recollect that at the close of our last year's Report we pointed out the great advantages that might be expected to accrue to these Provinces, if a steam communication could be extended along the Gulf shores, and on to Halifax. You are most likely informed that it is contemplated, in the coming season, to run a Steamer between Newfoundland and Halifax, touching at some port in Cape Breton. By running the St. George alternate weeks to Miramichi and to Ship Harbour, in Cape Breton, one very important part of the extensive communications we then glanced at would be accomplished, thereby establishing a regular communication by Steamboats with both Halifax and Newfoundland; and there is little doubt that the benefit to this community, and to the other Provinces, would be extensively felt. But with the limited means we are at present possessed of, and the insufficient encouragement hitherto experienced, the Directors felt that it would be imprudent to involve the Company in any new enterprise, without first ascertaining what additional aid might be obtained; and as they were informed that the Imperial Government had given large assistance to the Steamboat which is about to be employed between Halifax and Newfoundland, and as the St. George has been and is proposed to be employed in perfecting the Mail Post communications between the Mother country and some of the principal towns and places in these Provinces, besides the conveying of the Provincial Mails, they determined to Memorialize the Imperial Government for such assistance as the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury should be graciously pleased to grant; and they are happy to inform you, that upon communicating with His Excellency Sir H. V. Huntley upon the subject, His Excellency, with that readiness which he always displays whenever occasion offers for promoting the interests of this community, very kindly undertook to transmit our Memorial, with a strong recommendation of its prayer, to the proper authorities.

This Memorial went to England by the last Mail, and until an answer is received, final arrangements cannot be determined upon. It will be the business of the new Board of Directors—so soon as this is received—to resolve upon the future occupation of the St. George, and to obtain the approbation of the Legislature of the Island to any alteration it may think advisable and beneficial to the public service, and we therefore conclude this Report in full confidence that no exertion will be wanting on the part of the Board, to promote the advancement of the Company's affairs, and the general interests of the Island.

The following Resolutions were then proposed to the Meeting, and unanimously agreed to:—

I. Moved by the Hon. Charles Young, seconded by John Longworth, Esq.—

"That the Report, as read, be adopted, and printed for general information.

II. Moved by David Wilson, Esq., seconded by William Douse, Esq.—

"That the Treasurer's Accounts be received and adopted.

III. Moved by Mr. John Davis, jun., seconded by Henry Palmer, Esq.—

"That the thanks of the Shareholders be presented to the Directors of the Prince Edward Island Steam Navigation Company, for their careful management of the affairs of the Company during the past year."

The Chairman then informed the meeting that the gentlemen retiring from the Direction were Andrew Duncan, Esq., Capt. Swabey, and Francis Longworth, Esq., M. P. P. The meeting then proceeded to elect three persons to fill the vacant offices.

The Scrutineers, upon examination of the balloting papers, reported that Capt. Swabey, Francis Longworth Esq., and Andrew Duncan, Esq. were re-elected to the Direction of the Company.

The following gentlemen were appointed auditors for the ensuing year:—Mr. Benjamin Davis, Charles Hensley, Jr. Esq.

The Hon. Joseph Pope having been requested to take the Chair, the thanks of the meeting were voted to Charles Hensley, Esq., for his conduct in the Chair.
