SUCCESS!

The success of Sir Charles Tupper's tour throughout Canada continues. All along the line of his progress over the land, the people come in thousands to meet him and to greet him and his able lieutenants, Mr. Foster and Hugh John. In Montreal the demonstrations were really wonderful; and in every town throughout Ontario, large and small, the enthusiasm of the people manifests itself in large meetings, and warm welcomes—just as in Charlottetown and Summerside and other towns in the Maritime Provinces. The remarkable change in public feeling and sentiment is due to two facts: (1) The people have found out that the Liberal-Conservatives are honest and more patriotic men than they thought; and (2) the people have found out that the Liberals (so-called) are humbugs who haven't performed that which they publicly and solemnly promised to do. It has been well said that "if a man cheats me once, it is his fault; if he cheats me twice it is my fault." The people of Canada are not going to be cheated a second time by the false Liberals, who have increased expenditures, taxation and debt, although they were given revenues unprecedentedly large.

THOSE EMERGENCY RATIONS.

The following excerpt from a letter sent to Dr. Lett, of Guelph, by his son Kenyon, of "D" Battery, South Africa, gives the unprejudiced opinion of a soldier who has had actual experience with the notorious emergency food, which the Liberal majority in Parliament endorsed as being "a wholesome and serviceable ration":

"I see by the papers that the Government is having a hot time over the emergency ration. Well, to tell the truth, it is 'rotten,' or, in more polite language, 'not worth a cent.' It looks like bran and has no substance at all. The label says it is delicious with soup, but when there is soup you don't get emergency rations. One thing that speaks very badly for it is that two or three large boxes which were lying open 'were never touched.' If it had been the English ration it would have been 'out of sight' in short order. Some of us threw it away and used the cans for carrying grease in, so when inspection came we were to be charged \$1.60 for it, but for some reason or other they changed their minds."

—The boys could not use these rations; but then Dr. Devlin made \$3,000 out of the contract, which is quite an important item. It is well remarked by the Mail and Empire that Dr. Devlin is out along with the Toronto Globe for "five more years of a full pocket."

FOUR YEARS MORE.

"Let us have four years more," cries Mr. Tarte. And what for? To increase still more the expenditures, the debt, and the taxes. To destroy forever the prospect of Preferential Trade within the British Empire. To fatten Mr Tarte and his fellows out of the public crib. To fill up the Yukon with the creatures of Mr. Sifton. To permit Mr. Blair to complete his various railway schemes. To renew the international farce with the Americans. No, there have been enough of these follies in the four years that are past.—Le Journal, Montreal.

CORRUPTING THE PRESS.

The Brandon Independence is a fearless critic of the Minister of the Interior. Mr. Sifton's agents have been trying to buy its support, and have offered big money to the editor to turn the paper against Hugh John. The Independence exposes this corrupt attempt upon it, and declares that it stands true to the people, and preserves the principle embodied in its name. How can Mr. Sifton afford to buy up newspapers or to corrupt the public press? Whence comes the money to carry on this extraordinary business? It seems that nearly all of the Ottawa Ministers own or control agencies for "the moulding of public opinion." Mr. Tarte has one in Montreal. Mr. Fisher has another; Mr. Fielding has just secured control of a paper in Halifax; Mr. Blair has bought a paper in St. John; Mr. Mulock has established a personal organ in Toronto; Mr. Sifton runs a paper in Winnipeg. The Ministers are actually obliged to buy their newspaper support. But whence comes the money to create and sustain this cordon of "public opinion moulders"?—Mail and Empire.
