Rail Employees Hear Plea To Help Cut Down Accident Toll

Last night in the crowded dining-room of the Charlottetown Hotel, more than 300 railway employees, their wives and older children, heard two experienced officials tell of the awful toll taken in killed and injured as a result of accidents, which in a vast majority of cases, could have been prevented or avoided.

Speaking at the fifth annual "Family Accident Prevention" meeting, presided over by G.E. MacCallum, a stirring appeal was made by Inspector E.L. Martin of the R.C.M.P. with particular reference to highway accidents and a similar overture by R.B. Graham, Assistant General Manager, C.N.R. dealt with accidents in and about the home.

A one-minute silence was observed in memory of L.J. MacDonald, retired passenger agent at Charlottetown who passed away earlier in the day.

"Safety laws and regulations are based entirely on experience and are wasted unless due attention is paid to them by the people they are designed to protect," Inspector Martin said. "Safety is good common sense and should be practiced in the home, on jobs, at school, fishing or hunting and on the 'streets and highways.'"

He cautioned mothers regarding how dangerous and foolish it was to have faulty electric cords, rickety ladders etc. the use of which was "tempting fate."

"Scatter-brained drivers moving at excessive speed were a particular menace to children in school zones in their mad race to gain a minute or two," he said. Horn blowing may cause a child to dash out in front of a moving car. "It is practically impossible to predict what a small child will do."

Death Yesterday Of Mr. L. J. MacDonald

The death of Mr. Louis J. "Lute" MacDonald, 68, occurred suddenly yesterday morning at his home 18 Euston Street following several months of poor health.

A native of Charlottetown, the late Mr. MacDonald entered the employ of the Canadian National Railways in 1911. When he retired on June 30th, 1956, the late Mr. MacDonald was district freight and passenger agent for the CNR's Island Division, which position he had filled since 1947. At the time of his death he was president of the local branch of the Retired Railwaymen's Association.

At the outbreak of World War One, he enlisted with the Canadian Expeditionary Force, serving overseas with the 2nd Siege Battery, being very badly gassed in one of the major engagements. Following demobilization in 1919, the late Mr. MacDonald resumed his duties with the C.N.R.

Besides his wife the former George Connolly of Charlottetown, whom he married about thirty-five years ago, he is survived by two sons: Ian, an

engineer in South America, a daughter, a businesswoman in Newfoundland. A third son, Allister, an R.C.A.F. fighter pilot, was killed overseas during World War II.

Also surviving are three brothers: E.S. MacDonald, New York; F.C. MacDonald, Los Angeles and Joseph B. MacDonald, Moncton; and four sisters: Mrs. W.D. Gillis and Mrs. George MacCormac, both of Charlottetown; Miss Mary MacDonald and Miss Agnes MacDonald, both of Boston.

The funeral will be held Monday morning at 9 o'clock from St. Dunstan's Basilica.
