Several Island Ayrshires Establish Production Records

Several island-owned cows established new 240-305 day production records according to P.O.P. listings recorded in the May issue of the "Canadian Ayrshire Review" officials association publication. All animals shown scored 130 per cent or more of the breed class average in both milk and fat.

In the Mature Class (10 years and over) Fairvue Fashion Maid owned by A. MacRae and Sons, Charlottetown, posted a record of 12,378 pounds of milk, containing 561 pounds of fat, testing 4.04 per cent, and Charlottetown Sir Roderick Blossom, owned by the Charlottetown Experimental Farm, produced 10,647 pounds of milk, containing 496 pounds of fat testing 4.56.
