**Senators Report On Ammunition Shortage In Korea**

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Four of five Senators who investigated ammunition supplies in Korea reported Saturday that "there was a needless loss of American lives" because of shortages there.

While asserting "it is difficult to pinpoint the responsibility," they blamed policymakers of the recent administration "from former President Truman on down, for miscalculating the aggressive designs of international Communism." "This is a tragic episode which has been extremely costly to the American people," the report said. "A reputation of this type of miscalculation and inability to plan for the defence and security of the United States could result in catastrophe for this nation."

The fifth member of the investigating subcommittee, Senator Estes Kefauver (Dem.-Tenn.), disagreed with the finding that lives were lost because of ammunition shortages. Declaring this was based "on conflicting testimony between various army generals," Kefauver protested that many of the generalities and conclusions in the report "constitute a distortion of history."

The majority report was signed by Senator Margaret Chase Smith (Rep.-Me.), chairman of the armaments services subcommittee, and Senator Harry Byrd (Dem.-Va.), Robert Hendrickson (Rep.-N. J.), and John Cooper (Rep.-Ky.).

**Stolen Painting Found But Mystery Deepens**

VANCOUVER, (CP)—The Vancouver art gallery's stolen Constable painting "Hearne Bay" has been returned. The mystery of the theft is deeper than ever.

Painted by John Constable in the 19th century, the painting disappeared from the gallery's walls more than a year ago. It was valued at \$750.

G. H. Taylor, former curator of the gallery, spotted the picture on the wall of a home here while hunting for a house to rent. The homeowner said a man for whom he had done a favor years ago gave it to him as a present.

"The person involved in the home-owner said was entirely innocent," said present curator Jerry Morris. "He gladly turned it over to us."

The homeowner didn't know the name of the man who presented him with the nine by 12-inch picture. present and answered roll call by exchanging flower seeds or slips. Rev. S. H. Merriman, recently ordained to the Presbyterian Ministry in the First Presbyterian Church at St. John's, N. Y. who has been called for summer supply at Zion Presbyterian Church, Charlottetown, preached at both services yesterday in the presence of large congregations. He spoke in the morning on the Power of Christ, the Love of Christ and the Discipline of Christ. In the evening he dealt with the parable of the lost coin, emphasizing that the value of the coin was never appreciated, until it was lost; that what it represented, and emphasized that a coin to be useful must be circulated.

Rev. Mr. Merriman was born in Schenectady in 1924 and educated in the public schools there. He attended Davidson College in North Carolina, American College of Baritz, France, and was graduated from Union College. He attended Princeton Theological Seminary for two years and also Knox College in Toronto, for one year. He was graduated from Knox College early this month and was accepted by the Schenectady Presbytery at a meeting last week.

Mr. Merriman spent three years in military service and was overseas with General Patton's Third Army for 15 months with the rank of Staff Sergeant. He was student pastor of the Mariaville Presbyterian Church for one season and last summer served the Community Church at Brantford, Ont., O. He will continue his studies at New College, Edinburgh, Scotland on leaving Charlottetown next fall.

of all other countries. "Now, we have to state that Eisenhower's new speech reported on May 20 does not contain even a trace of his peace gesture...or deeds to support it."

In the May 20 speech, Eisenhower said that Soviet freedom had not been changed from the original Russian aim of destroying freedom everywhere, and said the West therefore must not let down its guard.

The Canadian Efficiency Medal for 12 years service in the Armed Forces was awarded Sgt. Leroy Gallant, of Summerside, and was presented to him by Group Captain J. A. Archambault, A.F.C., C.D., at Number 1 Group Headquarters, Quebec.

Sgt. Gallant first enlisted in the P.E.I. Highlanders and served six years with that regiment before the war. In 1941 he enlisted in the R.C.A.F. and was discharged four years later with the rank of Corporal, Equipment Assistant. He re-enlisted in 1948 as a leading airman and got his two stripes in 1951. He was promoted sergeant in April this year.

He is married and has two children, twins. He is presently residing at the R.C.A.F. Station at St. Hubert, Que. His parents live at 155 Hanover Street, Summerside.

**Dulles Favors New Type Middle East Defence Pact**

KARACHI, (Reuters)—U.S. diplomatic circles here say the current Middle East and Asian tour by State Secretary Dulles is to sow the seeds for a new type of Middle East defence organization. They say Dulles favors an organization springing directly out of the Middle East nations themselves, free from domination by other countries, including Britain and the United States, associated with the Middle East defence organization proposal of October, 1951.

Dulles is understood to feel that the earlier proposal was somewhat artificial, and that a new type of organization, formed by the countries of this area, would have better prospects of support from nations that had little enthusiasm for the previous project.

**Encouraging Progress Made In Drama Festival Movement**

The Provincial Drama Festival Association was organized in the fall of 1947, under the sponsorship of the Provincial Executive of the Women's Institutes. Local festivals had been held as early as 1945, but became a provincial organization in November of 1947.

The first Provincial Festival finals were held June 1st, 1948 in the Empire Theatre, Charlottetown. Two one-act plays: "All Carts to the Rescue" by Cape Traverser, Y. P. L. and "Evan Fly to Fly Thirty" by York Players were presented to a large audience. Mr. Donald Wetmore adjudicated.

In 1949, the Festival finals were held June 2nd and 3rd, in the auditorium of the Summerside High School. At that time the Junior Farmers' public speaking competition was combined with the presentation of plays. The play winning top honors that year was York Players' production "Utter Reluctance" and Cornwall Community Club's "The Girls and Macintosh." Once again the capable adjudicator was Mr. Wetmore.

1950 saw the Festival finals again at the Empire Theatre, with Mr. J. L. Robertson adjudicating. The winners of different classes in that year's competition were: Charlottetown Little Theatre's "Sunday Afternoon in Paris" with runners "Moon Up" by St. Peter's Anglican Y.P.A. from urban group. In the rural senior class Hunter River's W.I. carried off top honors with "The Dear Departed". Runner-up in Senior Rural Class was "The Dummy" by Kinkora Sodality. In the Junior Class were "Tom Sawyer Whitewashes the Fence" by Clyde River School, and "The Pampered Darling" by Kinkora Convent.

Parkdale Hall was the scene of the 1951 Festival finals, with Mr. J. L. Robertson as adjudicator. Hunter River's Institute play "The Valiant" took top honors, with York Players' "High Window" closely following. In the rural senior group, the Red Key by St. Peter's Anglican Y.P.A. and "The Spiders Ring" by Little Theatre Guild were first and second choice, respectively.

Among the Junior winners were: "Romance in Grey" by Astimarside school, "Doctor Manners" and "Mickey Does His Homework", both by pupils from Kinkora Convent. 1952 returned the Festival finals to Parkdale Hall when it was necessary to have four nights' entertainment in order to accommodate the number of semi-finalists. Indian River's play "Semi of Love" was chosen by Mr. Wetmore as best three-act play. Placing a close second was Souris St. Mary's Dramatic Club with "Shea's Wedding". Both these were in the rural group. The best one-act play was "Merry Molly Malone" by Inshstown W.I., according to Mr. Wetmore's choice. From the urban group came St. Peter's Anglican Y.P.A.—who have been "among the winners" each year they have participated in the "The Lord's Prayer".

The 1953 Festival, which will be officially opened on Tuesday night by the honorary president, Dr. Lloyd Shaw, will bring four nights of good entertainment to the Empire Theatre, Charlottetown. Two 3-act plays will fill two evenings' program, while the other two evenings will each contain three 1-act plays. Three of these will come from rural groups and three from urban.

The Drama Association is composed of voluntary workers representing the different geographical areas of the Province. None receives any remuneration, except for the satisfaction of seeing the Festival making good progress and the feeling of well-being in having contributed to its success. The Association has been fortunate in having had Mr. H. Barry Bugden as adjudicator during the semi-finals. He has given freely and good-naturedly of his valuable time and many talents to encourage the production of (and acting in) better plays.

Mr. Donald Wetmore of Halifax, who is Dramatics Adviser with the Department of Education, Education Branch, has been generously loaned to the Association to adjudicate the Festival finals (May 26, 27, 28 and 29th).
