**Accused In Rape Case Is Again Remanded**

At Magistrate's court at Georgetown on Wednesday, April 24th, before Stipendiary Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet, a resident of Abney charged with rape, under section 136 of the Criminal Code, was further remanded in custody and his case adjourned until May 8th. He was represented by G.R. Foster.

**Pope Has New Warning Against H-Bomb Danger**

VATICAN CITY (Reuters)—The unlimited power of nuclear explosions is becoming a catastrophic threat because "everybody seeks to surpass the other," the Pope has warned.

"In the case of natural disasters one cannot but bow before what happens at the command of the almighty," he said. "But if disasters were to be caused by one man's perverse lust for domination—with all the reprisals implied in it—how could such action not be condemned by every righteous soul?"

The Pontiff's views were expressed in a note handed to Japanese envoy Masafumi Matsuoka, Japan's special anti-nuclear test envoy, at a Vatican reception April 14 and published Wednesday in the Vatican city newspaper L'Osservatore Romano. Matsuoka is seeking world support in the Japanese campaign for an end to test explosions of nuclear weapons.

**CANNOT PREDICT**

The Pope said no one could predict with certainty the ultimate biological effects of nuclear explosions "on the living species."

He said: "The wise men of all nations and all faiths must feel the grave moral obligation to pursue the noble aim of mastering these energies in the service of man . . . instead of this terrifying and costly race towards death."

The Pope's statement was the second published in two days by a world figure on the dangers of nuclear explosions.

Philosopher - physician Albert Schweitzer, Nobel peace prize winner, said Tuesday that radioactivity is "a catastrophe to the human race." He appealed to public opinion to demand an end to nuclear tests.
