MELANCHOLY ACCIDENT.—On Wednesday last, two brothers named M'Pherson, one 16, the other 23 years of age, of Vernon River, were drowned by the upsetting of a sail-boat, about a mile below Vernon River Bridge.

We are informed that two very distinct shocks of an earthquake were felt in this City at a quarter past two o'clock this morning. They were of much longer duration than usual.

In digging a well in Bureau county, Ill. a vein of gas was struck, which burned with a flame fifteen feet above the surface of the ground. It was so near a dwelling house that it had to be closed up to save the house.

Steamer America arrived at Halifax last evening. Principal points of treaty of peace between France and Austria have been signed by the Plenipotentiaries, but not yet ratified by Government.

Count Collorodo has been attacked with apoplexy—little hopes of his recovery.

Great Eastern will not probably come to America before next spring. It is talked of her going to Lisbon. Prince Napoleon has paid her a visit.

Funeral of Robert Stephenson took place on the 21st. Great demonstration of respect shown. He has bequeathed £25,000 to public institutions.

Difficulties between Spain and Morocco. War imminent. FRANCE.—The projected China expedition has been discussed; it is proposed to despatch 18,000 men, but nothing definite has been arrived at.

Accounts from Cochinchina say that the French forces are so worn out by fatigue and disease, that they were preparing to abandon Touram and return to China.

ITALY.—Marshal Vaillant is reported writing to Napoleon, suggesting the occupation of the Duchies by troops, to prevent civil war breaking out.
