A Trio of Tragedies

An Ottawa despatch of the 21st says that a strange chapter of accidents was reported Saturday. A summons was recently issued against a French Canadian named Morreau for selling liquor without licence. The accused did not obey the summons and a warrant was, Friday, issued for his arrest. Saturday morning Morreau was found drowned in the shallow waters near Chaudiere Falls. Whether he was drowned forcibly or committed suicide does not appear.

Another strange occurrence is reported from Friel Street, Ottawa. The neighbors of an Italian carpenter, noticing his absence, entered his workshop, at the rear of his dwelling house, where he was seen at work late Friday night, on a job for the Ottawa university. On entering they saw the Italian lying dead in a pool of blood. Immediately the cry of murder was raised and the police and a doctor were summoned. The doctor declared that the man had been dead 12 or 14 hours, and death was caused through hemorrhage. The man had evidently dropped dead at night at his work.

A third accident was made known on the arrival of the train from the north on the Canadian Pacific bringing a report that during the recent high winds four men employed on telegraph line construction along the Canada Pacific were seriously injured by a falling telegraph pole. One of the men has been placed in a hospital. He has a broken neck and is not expected to live.

The City Schools.

ANNUAL MIDSUMMER EXAMINATIONS—UPPER PRINCE STREET SCHOOL.

The annual round of City School Examinations began in Upper Prince Street School to-day. The rooms were in nice order, and the scholars bright and happy in prospect of the holidays. A good many visitors were in attendance, including His Honor the Lieut. Governor, Hon. David Laird, W. E. Dawson, Esq., Chairman of the Board of School Trustees, Thomas Handrahan, Mr. Foley, Rev. W.
