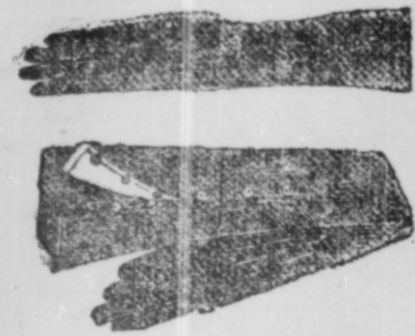

**A PLEASANT EVENING.**—There was a very enjoyable entertainment and basket social in York hall last night. It was in aid of the Prince Edward Island hospital, and the snug sum of \$35 was realized. **POLICE COURT.**—This forenoon Henry Welsh, Joseph Cameron and David Bell, charged with the Connolly burglary, were remanded for trial in the Supreme Court. The case of Charles Watling, charged with a breach of the Liquor Regulation Act, was adjourned for further evidence until the 30th March. Albert P. Allin, for drunkenness, was fined \$5 or 30 days.

**MONTREAL FATALITY.**—A Montreal despatch of the 21st says:—Four men were in town killed here today by the fall of scaffolding erected inside a large chimney for repairs. Men had just entered the place at the time. The killed were Louis Rocher, Henry Dalrymple, Eugene Deschamps and Archie Stewart. The fifth man, Xavier Trappier, was dug out seriously injured, after being four hours under the debris.

**HAD A BIG TIME.**—At the christening of the twin children of Mr. C. H. Seely, M. P., for Lincoln, Eng., and Mrs. Seely, the other day, the tenantry were entertained at the White Heart Hotel, where there was a christening cake, surmounted by a cradle and twins, and having other appropriate devices. The following day the whole of the school children of Lincoln were entertained at a tea, and each child received a piece of the christening cake, 9,000 packages having been made up for the occasion. The cake weighed two tons in all.
