The New Presbyterian Church at Cardigan Bridge.

ON Sunday, the 6th inst., the recently built Presbyterian Church at Cardigan Bridge was formally opened and dedicated for religious purposes.

The main building is 60 feet long, 32 feet wide, with post 20 feet high. To the south-west side a wing is attached, 26x22 feet, and at the south-east corner of the main building a tower 10 feet square rises to the height of 40 feet.

Between the main building and the wing, large folding doors are placed, by which a separation can be made, in case either part of the building is required for use.

Altogether, the plan and arrangement of this building are excellent, and reflect great credit on Mr. Baker, of Summerside, the architect.

We neglected mentioning that the building has 26 lamps and is heated by 3 stoves. No finer day could be asked for dedicating the church than last Sabbath.

The service began by singing the 100th Psalm, that good old stand-by of the Presbyterian Church.

A portion of the 10th chapter of Hebrews was read, and the 132nd Psalm, from verse 13, was sung, commencing "For God of Zion has made choice."

Services were held at 3 o'clock and 6 o'clock p. m., which were well attended. Rev. Mr. Spencer, of Montague, was present at the latter and assisted Mr. Carruthers. The collections amounted to over \$100.

THE DEADLY CYCLONE.

Number of Persons Killed.

DESTRUCTION OF PROPERTY.

PITTSBURG, Pa., Jan. 9.

A new six story building in process of erection on Diamond Street was blown down in a gale at 12.30 to-day. The crash was heard many blocks away.

PITTSBURG, Jan. 9.

At 10 o'clock to-night a number of persons were known to be still underneath the debris. Up to that hour 40 mangled and bruised bodies have been taken from the ruins.

Number Two shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Richmond Street and north of Dorchester Street.

Number Three shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Grafton Street and north of Richmond Street.

Number Four shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Fitzroy Street and north of Grafton Street.

Number Five shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies north of Fitzroy Street, including the Common of the said Town.
