THE MANITOBA ACT.

Government Will Not Veto It.

OTTAWA, April 7.

The Government has decided not to interfere with the legislation of Manitoba abolishing the Roman Catholic Separate Schools and the official use of the French language in the legislature and courts of that Province. The Manitoba Act contains special provision for the protection of the minority in respect to education. The question of the constitutionality of the Education Act is now before the courts, and the future action of the Government may safely be allowed to be held in obedience pending the decision of the courts. It is understood that the Government will defray the cost of litigation regarding dual language. The Minister of Justice expresses doubts as to its constitutionality, but considers the courts the proper place to adjudicate upon that point.

ANOTHER STEAMER

Between Halifax and Boston.

HALIFAX, April 7.

The Boston, Halifax and P. E. Island Steamship Company has purchased the steamer State of Indiana from the State Line, and will put her on the Line between Halifax and Boston the coming summer. This boat is of iron, 2,584 tons, gross tonnage, and has guaranteed speed of fourteen knots. She carries four hundred passengers. Her advent will make keen competition for the Boston trade from Halifax. The agreement between this Line and the Canadian Atlantic terminated January first last.

THE IRISH LEADER

A Sensational Rumor.

LONDON, April 7.

A sensation was caused in the lobby of the House of Commons last evening, by the rumor that Mr. Parnell has been privately married since the O'Shea divorce proceedings. Several of the Parnellites declined to say more than that the mystery of the Irish Leader's inner life, so often referred to recently will be solved, that it is certain that Parnell's character will shortly be vindicated. According to rumor the lady whom Parnell has married is not Mrs. O'Shea.

The health of Prince Albert Victor, eldest son of the Prince of Wales and heir presumptive to the throne, is again causing considerable anxiety among members of the Royal Family.

REFORM IN NEW BRUNSWICK

Abolition of the Legislativ e Council.

FREDERICTON, April 7.

In the Legislative Council, yesterday afternoon, the Privileges Committee submitted a report in reference to the case of Jas. I. Fellows, confirming him in his seat. Mr. Blaine introduced last night his bill for the abolition of the Legislative Council.

British Parliament.

LONDON, April 7.

In the House of Commons yesterday, Mr. Henry Smith, First Lord Treasurer, said that the Government had not received any note from France on the subject of the purchase of French treaty rights in Newfoundland by withdrawal of British troops in Egypt.

Reciprocity Negotiations Postponed.

WASHINGTON, April 7.

The proposed conference of Canadian ministers and Blaine on the subject of reciprocity of trade between Canada and the United States, has been postponed for present. President Hamilton desires to be present when the negotiations are undertaken, and his projected southern and western trip would not admit of this if the negotiations were to proceed at once. The Canadians will return to Washington as soon as the President can conveniently give his attention to the subject.
