UNITED STATES AND SPAIN.

No New Developments.

President McKinley Steadfast to His Convictions and His Plan.

WASHINGTON, March 30.—The cabinet meeting held yesterday developed nothing new.

The President remains steadfast in his convictions as to what is his duty; and all the adverse criticism, which it is asserted is mainly due to misinformation as to the situation or ignorance of the President's purpose, will not be permitted to swerve him in the least degree from the course he has planned.

THE CHINESE QUESTION.

No Humiliation and no Back-down on the part of Great Britain.

POLICY OF "AN OPEN DOOR" INTACT.

Valuable Compensations Obtained.

LONDON, March 30.—Warlike preparations continue here.

Considerable importance is attached to the speech of Lord Selborne, Under Secretary of State for the Colonies, in this city, yesterday. He declared that there was no more humiliation for England in failing to exclude Russia from the Manchuria than there would be for Russia in failing to exclude England from Khartoum. England has lost nothing in China which ought to have been kept. The policy of an open door is intact. We have already obtained valuable compensations and are in a position to obtain more if we require them.

PARLIAMENT OF CANADA.

The Yukon Deal in the Senate

Franchise Bill Read a Second Time.

OTTAWA, March 30.—The Yukon railway deal is still under discussion in the Senate. Sir McKenzie Bowell, in a speech, yesterday condemned the scheme on principle and in detail. The expected vote will be taken this evening.

In the House of Commons vigorous addresses were made by the Conservatives in opposition to the Franchise bill.

Mr. Powell proposed an amendment that the bill be not read a second time, which was lost by a vote of 97 to 48. The second reading passed.

RICHMOND, March 28.—Mr. C. C. Carley, who has been prospecting for coal at Coal Branch, Kent Co., has been quite fortunate having struck a seam that varies from 32 to 36 inches in thickness. The coal is of excellent quality for steam or heating purposes and is so hard that some competent judges pronounce it equal to fairly good anthracite. The mine is within a few miles of the I. C. R. The average output will be from 10 to 20 tons per diem.

A BRILLIANT MANOEUVRE.

Capture of Shendy on the Nile.

Dervishes Cut Off From Their Base of Supply.

CAIRO, March 30.—Shendy, on the Nile, was taken by surprise. A gunboat with a battalion of Egyptians on board ascended the Nile from the mouth of the Atbara river and arrived at Shendy by dawn on Saturday. The gunboat shelled the forts and then a battalion was landed and attacked the town. The capture of Shendy was a brilliant manoeuvre, as the main body of the Dervishes who had advanced against the Anglo-Egyptian forces from Shendy is now cut off from its base of supply and its reserve depot is destroyed.

LONDON March 28.—When events in the far east began to assume a serious aspect, the British foreign office made the unpleasant discovery that its despatches were being tampered with. It became necessary to discard the old cipher, and devise a special one.

LONDON March 29.—The Daily Chronicle says: "We have reason to believe an area of 10,000 square miles in the province Shan-Si has been conceded to a syndicate of English capitalists. If this is true, it is obvious that Lord Salisbury has approved the scheme."

LONDON, March 28.—In the house of commons to-day A. J. Balfour, first lord of the treasury, government leader, and acting minister for foreign affairs, replying to Sir William Vernon Harcourt, the liberal leader in the house, promised a ministerial statement on the situation in the far east before Easter.

The Globe (conservative) says this afternoon: "The disappointment of the government supporters in the progress of affairs in the far east, is becoming more acute. Unless it is found that the government has secured some tangible advantage, riot will set in among its supporters. It is reported, however, from the best quarters that the best apparent diplomatic defeat of Great Britain makes a move of great importance, which will give Great Britain a favorable position."

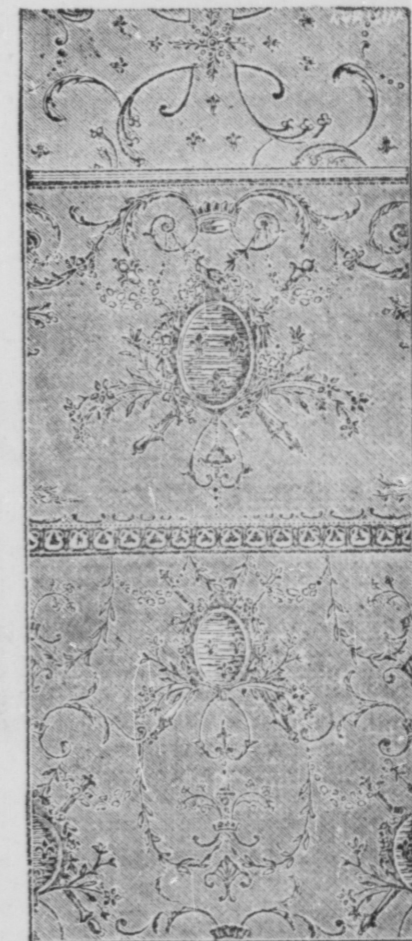
