CHANGES IN THE BRITISH ARMY

Outlined by Lord Lansdowne.

Laurier and Langelier at Daggers Drawn.

DEATH OF JOSEPH McDONALD, ESQUIRE, IN HALIFAX.

British Army Policy.

LONDON, Dec. 10.—The Secretary of State for War, speaking at Edinburgh yesterday, outlined the military policy of the government. Lord Lansdowne, after remarking that the country had been confronted during the last few months with difficulties in every part of the globe, not of her own seeking—especially mentioning the Behring Sea and Venezuela controversies—said that three army corps were required, adding that two must be available for offensive purposes abroad. He asserted that he was still of the opinion that only a moderate service with the colors was expedient but he hoped to be able to increase the establishment of each home battalion thus securing a large margin of seasoned soldiers by contracting with small numbers of reservists who, for extra payment, would agree, if necessary, to rejoin the colors during first year of result. In summing up the policy of the Government Lord Lansdowne said that our intention is to maintain what is good for the present system and to supplement it where deficient.

Split Among the Liberals.

MONTREAL, Dec. 10.—The split between the old-time Liberals as distinguished from the present so-called Liberals, and the Government has developed into a chasm.

The Witness publishes an interview with the Hon. Francis Langelier, the man who was promised the position of Lieutenant-Governor and whom Sir Wilfrid Laurier now refuses to appoint in view of the Chapleau deal. Mr. Langelier says he has had no communication with Sir Wilfrid Laurier, verbally or in writing, since September the 16th, last, and that he does not expect to until he meets him in the House of Commons next session. Mr. Langelier talks straight from the shoulder, and says that he will be surprised hereafter at nothing that Laurier and his men may do.

A Mysterious Order.

LONDON, Dec. 10.—The Evening Telegraph says that the War Office has sent an order to Dublin for the sharpening of all sword bayonets in the possession of the regular troops in Ireland. The order is unprecedented and is a perfect mystery to the officers and men.

Death of Mr. Joseph McDonald.

HALIFAX, Dec. 10.—Joseph McDonald, a member of the firm of A. A. McDonald & Co., Georgetown, P. E. Island, died here this morning.

Two Boys Drowned.

HALIFAX, Dec. 10.—Two brothers, 7 and 13 years of age, sons of Mr. Fred Jolimore, of this city, were drowned while playing on the ice at Colpitt lake yesterday.

Assassination Frustrated.

LONDON, Dec. 10.—A despatch says that two soldiers in the imperial service made an attempt yesterday on the life of the Sultan of Turkey, but it was frustrated by the Sultan's attendants.

Verdict of Guilty.

TRURO, N. S., Dec. 10.—Lyman Dartt, on trial charged with the murder of the Arabian peddler, has been found guilty, with a recommendation to mercy. This forenoon Dartt was sentenced to be hanged on March 3rd.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL.

LONDON, December 7.—According to a despatch to the Morning Post from Bombay, the operations of the British punitive expedition under Sir William Lockhart, on the north-west frontier of India, which began about the middle of September last, will cease presently and be resumed in the spring.

BERLIN, Dec. 7.—Emperor William, talking over the trouble between Germany and Hayti, is stated as saying: "They are a contemptible crowd of negroes, slightly inoculated with French civilization. My school ships, even though only manned by boys, will teach them manners."

TORONTO, December 7.—A deputation of retail merchants waited on the civic council last night and urged the imposition of a progressive tax on departmental stores based on the amount of business done by them. The aldermen gave a sympathetic hearing, but Ald. Scott, who presided said the council was powerless to do anything without the consent of the legislature. Some of those present estimated that, on the proposed basis of taxation, the Eaton company would pay from \$150,000 to \$200,000, which it is believed would simply drive them out of business.

LONDON, Dec. 7.—Walter Croot of Newcastle, England, died this morning from the effect of injuries received last night when defeated by Jimmy Barry of Chicago for the bantam weight championship of the world. The knockout blows were on the heart and chin. He did not recover consciousness and death was due to concussion of the brain. Barry has been arrested.

ATLANTA, Ga., Dec. 7.—Atlanta is just now the theatre of an active vaccination war. The large negro population is fighting vaccination, and compelling the physicians to take around with them armed policemen. Learning of a stylish negro wedding Sunday night, the officers crept up on the house and kept inmates controlled within, while the physicians dully vaccinated the bride and all her attendant companions. Yesterday morning a somewhat similar scene took place in the city court room which is always crowded with negroes. At a signal from Judge Reed every door and window was guarded and all present were vaccinated. In some cases the negroes have remained away from home for weeks trying to evade the law.

BERLIN, December 7.—In the reichstag to-day Herr Richter, the radical leader, during the second day's debate upon the first reading of the naval bill, opposed that measure, dwelling upon the serious increase of expenditure. He contended that the great display of power made in China proved that the government consider the navy equal to the task imposed upon it. Germany's exports, he continued, had made unexpected strides in spite of the alleged lack of cruisers, and the speaker expressed the opinion that the protective duties were more harmful to Germany's trade than could be balanced by the benefits derivable by the greatest fleet. The bill, he asserted, was not for seven years, but for eternity, and created a condition which the continual advance of technical knowledge would make it impossible to maintain. Emperor William has ordered the number of volunteers for the China expedition to be increased to 1,000 men.

The Times, Standard and other London papers editorially praise Lieut. Perry's Arctic work, and wish him success in his next undertaking.
