CIVIC ESTIMATES.—The Amherst Town Council report estimates for the current year for \$22,706; against this there are \$5,154 in assets, making the total to be assessed \$17,552. The assessable property in the town is \$17,258,770, which gives a rate of \$1.00 on the \$100. The assessment is over \$1,000 greater than last year.

BIG FUTURITY STAKES.—Probably the richest futurity stake ever offered in America for either the trotting or the running horse is that offered at Independence, Ia. It is called the Progressive Futurity, and its sponsor is the Independence Driving Park Association. It is for foals of 1892 to be trotted as two-year-olds during the great summer meeting at Independence in 1894. It is not a guarantee stake, but to the amount paid in by nominators the association will add \$10,000. All the payments tendering a horse eligible to start will approximate only \$50 and these divided into four instalments, covering an average period between each of eight months.
