to Christians, Jamaica. Betty took refresher courses to enable her to teach shorthand and typing in the same technical school.

As an older person looking at the younger people here, I am tremendously impressed," Mrs. Adams said.

The volunteers will be paid according to a local salary scale—in many places a subsistence-level stipend. But most of them disregard the material side of their two years.

GOING TO BOLOVIA

"If you're interested in making money, you wouldn't be here," said John Kirkgarde, of Bradford, Ont. John, 24, just out of McMaster University, Hamilton, Ont., with a BSc. in chemistry, will be teaching in Bolivia.

The Adams do not expect their work to end with the completion of their teaching assignment. "A big part of it will come with our return to Canada—even if we only influence a few people," said Mr. Adams. He feels Canadians have "so much to offer the other world of poverty."

The Adams made enthusiastic plans to join other CUSO volunteers, in Jamaica for a centennial celebration on July 1, 1967.

Approximately 600 people are in the field this year, taking the chance CUSO offers them to serve in Africa, India, South America and the Caribbean.

Nurses and teachers are the largest categories of volunteers, but jobs range from accountants to stenographers to zoologists.

All work as individuals in their assigned countries, and are only sent in response to requests from governments or other appropriate agencies. They pay their own way by earning local salaries, but CUSO gives them small settlement grants from its administration fund provided by private donations and government grants.

Agreement With Nfld. Is Urged

MONTREAL (CP) — Jean Gerin-Lajoie, Quebec leader of the United Steelworkers of America, has urged the provincial government to permit Hydro-Quebec to reach an agreement with the British Newfoundland Corp. regarding the proposed Churchill Falls hydroelectric development.

Mr. Gerin-Lajoie said an agreement between the provincially-owned power utility and Brinco would prevent the Labrador project from being lost "in a frozen desert while the parties concerned engage in fantastic arguments."

"Workers and the population of the underdeveloped north shore region ardently want to see the development of Churchill Falls in the name of the steelworkers. I encourage Premier Daniel Johnson to permit Hydro-Quebec to ratify agreement with Brinco."

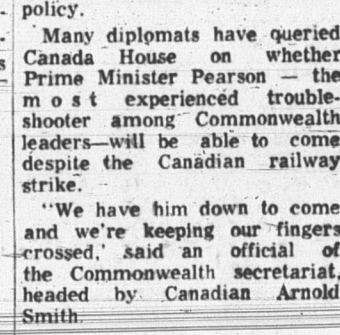
The signing of an agreement between Brinco and Hydro-Quebec would not indicate recognition by Quebec of the disputed boundary between the province and Labrador, Mr. Gerin-Lajoie said.

He said the proposed Churchill Falls development would result in an influx of population and industry along the north shore and would provide employment for the regions inhabitants.

SINKS AT LAUNCHING BREMERHAVEN

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CONTRACT BRIDGE

OPENING LEAD QUIZ

Here is an opening lead problem presented by the British Bridge World to a select group of international stars.

You are South, East-West are vulnerable, and the bidding has been:

North East South West
Pass Pass 1♦ 1♠
5♦ 5♥ 5♣ 5♠

Your hand is:

♠K743 ♠A J10664 ♠A82

Which card would you lead?

The panel voted this way: 8 for the ace of hearts, 3 for the ace of clubs, 2 for the three of spades; 1 for the jack of diamonds.

Alan Hiron, conductor of the panel, commented: "After this lively auction, it seems a fair idea to lead one of our aces in order to inspect dummy before deciding upon the best method of attack. Unfortunately, it is possible that this will be too late and our releasing the ace be a fatal move. If the setting trick must come from a ruff in partner's hand, then either the ace of clubs or a small spade lead looks better than the ace of hearts."

Other comments were:

LE BENTU: Ace of hearts. I want to see the dummy. I hope I will not be wrong to be so curious!

CROWHURST: Ace of hearts.

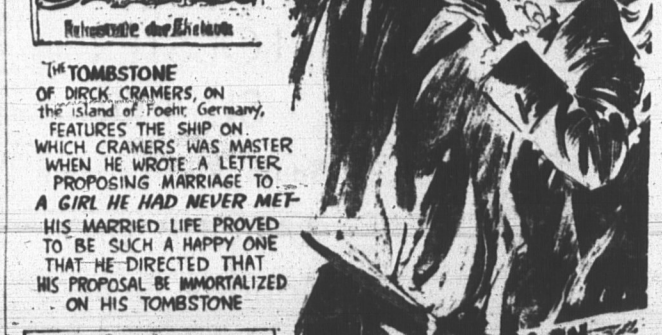
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
